

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES from the meeting in July 2011

Public Participation

A number of residents attended the meeting to discuss Northumberland County Council's Planning application for a wind turbine at Waite Farm.

(Haydon Bridge High School)

Peter Ninnim spoke for the group of people against this scheme. He explained that while they opposed this scheme, due to the high visual impact it will have on the village and surrounding area, they did not oppose wind turbine power generation. He felt that the matter could have been better dealt with had NCC consulted those most affected by the scheme prior to making a planning application. It was pointed out that a wind turbine of different design had already received planning permission as part of the High School Eco Centre, without local objection. This one will not be installed if the proposal under consideration is given the go ahead. Steve Ford spoke in favour of the proposed scheme outlining the benefits and offering an alternative view on noise factors, birds strikes and flicker from the rotating blades.

In their discussion later in the meeting councillors wanted to know why the previously agreed scheme needed to change if one of the main objectives of the whole Eco Centre Project was its educational value. If this was the case then the previous proposals seemed superior as it was on the High School site. The visual impact of the new proposals also gave rise to concern. The Council decided to oppose the application.

Julie Humes, Youth Worker, then gave a brief presentation to the Parish Council on the work done by the Youth Club in the village and the use made each year of the grant received from the Parish Council. Later in the meeting the Council agreed to give a grant of £2,000 to the Youth Club to be used to pay rental for hire of premises and purchase equipment for the club as well as some revenue costs. The Youth Club are to present accounts at the end of the financial year to show how the grant was spent.

A member of the public asked for a seat to be provided on the pavement route to the Spa Well. The suggested site is at the top of the rise as the pavement turns east by the access lane leading to the waste water treatment plant. The Council agreed as it has money set aside for a seat.

It was noted that the waste bin in the Old Cemetery was no longer there. NCC, responsible for closed cemeteries, is to be asked to provide a replacement bin.

Council Meeting

8 councillors present.

3 apologies for absence received from Parish Councillors and also from the NCC Councillor.

NCC Report

Councillor Sharp sent in a written report, read by the Clerk. He drew the Council's attention to the following matters:

The dropped kerb on Strothers Close is now in place and the quoins have been replaced at the kerb edge outside the chip shop.

NCC is to deal with the cleaning of the underpass and remove any graffiti.

The transfer of the Innerhaugh Play Area to the Parish Council is ready to complete and headway is being made on the transfer of the Showfield Play Areas.

In a reference made to a meeting between Parish Councillors and County Council Officers and Councillors on the transfer of services he note that the meeting went well and that most matters were settled except for the responsibility for the maintenance of the public toilets in John Martin Street.

Councillor Sharp concluded by congratulating the Haydon Bridge Cricket Team for winning the cup by defeating Benwell Hill Cricket Club recently.

Highways

The Council received notice of the proposed extensions to the 30mph zone at the Peelwell/North Bank road junction. The signs are to be moved back from the corner to further up the North Bank and to a point beyond Haydon View Care Home to the top of the lane to West Rattenraw. The Council welcomed these changes. NCC Highways is to be asked to do further repair work on the West Rattenraw lane as the patching recently completed was felt to be unsatisfactory.

Planning

As well as the application for the Wind Turbine, discussed earlier, the Council also received the following planning applications:

Modification to the plans for the

business premises at West End Joinery. Installation of flue to wood pellet boiler at Shaftoe Trust First School.

Retrospective planning permission for the retention of the building on land east of Haydon Bridge for the use of keeping horses during the winter months.

No objections were raised to these applications.

Correspondence

Following discussion last month on the need for housing in the 'commuter pressure belt', the Council was informed that the area referred to includes Haydon Bridge but not Haltwhistle.

The changes introduced to the rail service from Haydon Bridge are to be modified following complaints from the Council and rail users. Initially, the 15.24 to Newcastle is to be reinstated from Oct 23rd with possible further timetable changes later in the year.

The Council was informed of the error in the original notice for the closure of parts of North Bank and Church Street for road works. The road will NOT be closed in the daytime but from 18.00hrs -06.00hrs, during the period August 11th to September 6th, for the work to be completed overnight.

NCC Planning Dept informed the council that discussions on the tree planting proposals for the northern boundary of the Showfield Development have taken place and Riverside housing Association is to consult those residents affected.

**HAYDON BRIDGE BAND
Part 7**

The early parts of this history can be found in *The Haydon News* issues February to July 2011.

In spite of the loss of Lance Spooner secretary and treasurer, and Harry Swallow conductor and bandmaster, two of the band's leading lights with ninety years commitment to the band between them, the future still looked bright in March 1977, with a bank balance of over £2,100, treble the amount on deposit in 1970, and a number of new members including: K. Cousins, Stuart Robson, Nigel Clemitson, George Watling, F. Smith, A. Clark, Miss Jocelyn Brown, Miss S. Benniams, Miss S. Borthwick, Miss M. Thompson and Miss C. Thompson.

To lead the Haydon Bridge Silver Band into the 1980s, Peter Brown was appointed Chairman, Edward (Ned) Davison - Vice Chairman, Dryden Smith - Secretary, Edward Waite - Treasurer and Chris Richardson - Conductor and Bandmaster.

The society's trustees were: Mrs Florie Turnbull, Nevin Kirsopp, J.C. (Johnny) Heslop, Dr. Robert High and Edward Waite.

In October 1980 the treasurer reported a healthy bank balance of £3,193.52, although the number of local playing members had reduced considerably and, by this time, outsiders were being brought in to complement the Haydon Bridge bandsmen.

These visiting bandsmen included: George Brown, Langley; T. Clements, Rowlands Gill; S. Gardiner, Medomsley; M. Irwin, Hexham; E. Hall, Heaton; W. Laidler, Blackhill; D. Nelson, Corbridge; Bobby Wright and N. Smith, Haltwhistle; A. Patterson, Broomlee; R. Armstrong, Bardon Mill.

Mr Waite also informed the October meeting, that the trustees of the band planned to 'run tutorial classes for young players' and that would lead to 'the purchase of instruments, uniforms and music'. According to Mr Waite, a large amount of cash would be required and therefore, **'the trustees had taken over the band's money making activities'**.

Mr Waite reported that an appeal for finance from patrons / sponsors had been issued in July 1980 and one hundred and sixteen positive responses and £446 had

JULY 1980 APPEAL FOR THE HAYDON BRIDGE SILVER BAND

Our Silver Band, which has given so much pleasure to us and the whole district for more than a century, is in mortal danger of extinction and, should this happen it will mean not only the loss of an institution and tradition of which we are all proud, but a mark of shame to the community that it should have allowed such a thing to happen without a fight.

It will mean a fight! Not only an initial effort but a sustained one, for years ahead, if the band is to be revitalised and sit soundly on a basis that will enable it to grow, out of new local talent, into a band that will truly be THE HAYDON BRIDGE Band, to give us and the district pleasure and pride, but will help our young people, boys and girls, to develop a hobby which will give them great satisfaction, lasting friendships and a wider social life but also counter the depression and despair of poor employment prospects and may even lead to employment.

We, the trustees, who are not playing members of the band, although we work in the closest co-operation with them, have determined to make a fight for the survival of the band by setting it on a sound financial basis which we believe has a chance of success.

Our efforts of course are entirely dependant on support from the whole Haydon Bridge community but we have the belief and faith in the generosity of our people, who have proved themselves so in the past, that we can succeed and that our band will not die through lack of finance.

A scheme for patrons, people who will pledge to give £1 or over, every year, has been started and we hope that we can count on every household in the parish becoming patrons. Patrons from outside the district will also be welcome and a full list of patrons will be published and they will be kept informed of progress.

£1 is a pound and times are hard and may well get worse.

But 2p per week, regularly saved is also £1 at the end of the year and 2p put by a child into a bedside Piggy Bank every week could make him or her a patron of the band by the year end - and possibly save him/her a trip to the Dentist if it would otherwise have gone on sweets.

How often in the pub or in the shops do you find you have those stupid 1/2p coins, and other 'brass' that just make a hole in your pocket? You may soon find 'Save the Band' boxes in shops and pubs that will help solve your problem.

We believe that 'a little and often' given regularly from everyone is not impossible to ask of the people of Haydon Bridge and we believe the effort will be worthwhile.


It must be worth a try!

been received. A further £672.02 was raised under deeds of covenant.

It is not possible to list all those who supported the trustees' initiative, however, a copy of one interesting response survives.

Mr Waite spoke positively about the future of the Haydon Bridge Band and Dr High outlined proposals drawn up by the

trustees for the young members section, with tutors provided by the band and by the Northumberland Education Authority.

A number of new and young members attended the society AGM chaired by Peter Brown, on May 31st 1981, including: L. Worthington, B. Young, H. Young, P. Burrows, S. Richardson, C. Hutchinson, M. Hutchinson, M. Wallace, J. Alexander, P. Robinson and C. Burrows.

Mr Johnny Heslop made special reference at the meeting as to how well Alan Armstrong's tuition for young people at the High School was being dovetailed with the special training sessions organised by the bandmaster Chris Richardson.

In 1982, Philip Rutherford was appointed Secretary and Librarian of the Haydon Bridge Silver Band, a clear sign that younger members of our community had an important part to play in the future of what was a well established parish society. The rest of the committee comprised: Peter Brown, Edward Davison, Chris Richardson, Edward Waite, D. Brown, H. Davies, Clive Hutchinson and Mark Wallace.

By June 1983, John Bell of Haltwhistle had replaced Chris Richardson as the band's conductor and bandmaster, Mr Richardson having resigned during the year. John Bell worked at the Hadrian Paint Works and in his spare time took charge of the Haltwhistle Silver Band and the concert group the 'Singing Waiters'. It was clear, therefore, that he couldn't continue at Haydon Bridge on a permanent basis and advertisements for a conductor were placed in the Newcastle Journal, the Evening Chronicle and the Hexham Courant. In 1983, the band entertained at fifteen engagements and continued the tradition of annual Christmas playing with John Bell as their conductor.

A positive balance sheet, a young secretary and many new young members of the band, encouraged through the High School and band members' tutorials, suggests that the future was bright for the Haydon Bridge Silver Band. In 1984, however, the first signs of disharmony in the ranks were recorded, in the minutes of a meeting on Sunday June 24th.

Mr Waite, in presenting his treasurer's report, pointed out that £4,500 had been paid out on instruments, uniforms, music and tuition fees since October 1980, and

some younger band members on the committee were seeking to spend even more money on additional instruments and activities. Others, however, including trustee Johnny Heslop and chairman Peter Brown, urged caution and pointed out that the positive balance sheet and the £4,500 referred to by the treasurer had been raised through the efforts of the trustees, with very little support from individual band members.

It seems that those who had played little or no part in raising the band's funds were the most determined to spend the money raised.

At the end of the 1984 meeting, Peter Brown said that he could no longer continue as a member of the band and also resigned as Chairman of the society.

Peter was thanked for almost fifty years dedication to the Haydon Bridge Band.

It is an interesting thought that throughout the many years when the band lacked adequate finance, the togetherness developed through a strong leadership, close family ties and a shared responsibility to raise funds, by playing and non - playing members alike, guaranteed the future of **their** band. That communal spirit seems to have been missing in the society's later years, when the trustees provided thousands of pounds from patrons and sponsors, but eventually doubted whether the younger band members recognised the value of the income they were receiving, in spite of (*Or perhaps because of?*) a minimum

amount of effort on their part.

It is so sad to recall the strength of feeling towards the Haydon Bridge Band, as witnessed by the response to the trustees' 1980s appeal, and yet to report that by November 22nd 1984, the trustees questioned the attitude of some of the younger band members and officials and doubted their ability to undertake the future affairs of the band in a responsible manner.

The trustees found it necessary to suspend all the activities of the band.

(See letter below.)

The band members, in response to the suspension of activity, 'held meetings to elect a committee to look after their affairs and to represent their point of view' and, in a terse statement on November 26th 1984, 'unanimously decided to resign immediately from the Haydon Bridge Silver Band.'

So, in November 1984, the Haydon Bridge Silver Band had played its last chord and one hundred and fifty years of harmonious tradition in our parish was consigned to the archives.

On January 26th 1992, a meeting was held at Tynholme, Haydon Bridge to discuss the future of the Haydon Bridge Band and its assets. The meeting was attended by Johnny Heslop, Peter Brown, Dr. Robert High, Florence Turnbull, Alan Armstrong (Haydon Bridge High School) and J. Richardson (Shaftoe Trust Educational Foundation). Dr. High pointed out that a number of events had occurred leading to the meeting being called. Namely:

- The death of Edward Waite after a long

The Trustees of the charity have unanimously agreed to recall ALL band assets immediately to the Community Centre and suspend all band practices and activity until further notice.

Would all members please co-operate in order to allow the Trustees to exercise their stewardship of the charity that includes their ultimate responsibility to the Charity Commissioners, the general public residing in the Parish of Haydon and to the many subscribers by covenant and subscription who support the band's activity.

IT IS A MATTER OF FACT that recent dissension within the band, leading to quite a serious number of resignations, with extra expense to bring in 'outside' players to perform functions satisfactorily, INDICATES THAT THE CHARITABLE OBJECTS ARE BEING SERIOUSLY ERODED TO THE POINT AT WHICH THE TRUSTEES MUST EXERCISE THEIR PEROGATIVE IN THE MATTER.

illness during which meetings of the trustees had not taken place.

- The resignation of Mr. N. Kirsopp who had moved out of the area.

- A request by the Haydon Bridge Community Association that the property (instruments) belonging to the band be moved as the room was required for other purposes.

It was accepted at the meeting that the band, as such, no longer existed or functioned. It was agreed, however, that the Shaftoe Trust Foundation would continue to support a £2,500 annual honorarium for Mr. Alan Armstrong in respect of his tuition which benefitted the young people of Haydon Bridge.

At a meeting in October 1993, the trustees agreed to a change in the band's charity name and registration. A change that was accepted by the Charity Commissioners and read as a single commitment:

'The objectives of the Haydon Bridge Silver Band Memorial Fund are to advance the education of the inhabitants of the Parish of Haydon, in the art and science of music.'

The trustees were planning for the winding up of the Haydon Bridge Band as a society, although during this process they continued to finance causes that supported young people and their music. For example, in 1994, £105 towards the High School's 'Shaftoe/Haydon Bridge Band'. In 1995 a grant of £50 to Rachel

Fletcher, a student at Leeds College of Music. In 1995 and in 1996, £70 donations to the Haydon Bridge High School Music Department and in 1997 £76 for a copyright licence for music for Allendale Middle School.

An interesting incident occurred in 1997 which illustrated that the band's 'Memorial Fund' was being managed within the strict democratic rules as laid down by the Charity Commissioners.

Dr. High invited the rest of the trustees to a meeting at Ridley Hall where they were given a demonstration of an organ which Dr. High, in good faith, had promised to buy for Ridley Hall out of the Memorial Fund. Following the demonstration there was some dispute as to whether one trustee should be making spending decisions without the approval of the others. Furthermore, it was pointed out that the pupils at Ridley Hall did not meet the criteria as, 'inhabitants of Haydon Bridge'. In the event, Dr. High kept his promise to Ridley Hall, but paid for the organ out of his own pocket!

The band's charity was eventually wound up on August 13th 1997 when the trustees issued three cheques each of £2,149.49 to Haydon Bridge Shaftoe Trust School, Allendale Middle School, and Haydon Bridge High School. A total of £6,448.47 that represented the remaining assets of the Haydon

Bridge Silver Band Memorial Fund.

I will close this history with my happy memories of the society's halcyon days and a score or more of bandsmen's feet, marching tramp, tramp, tramp, tramp, to the rhythm of the brass and the booming beat of Anderson Robinson's Bass Drum, as the melodious strains of the famous Haydon Bridge Band waft through the balmy air.

HAYDON BRIDGE BEER FESTIVAL 2011

July 8th and 9th saw the second Haydon Bridge Beer Fest, this year staged over two days following on from the success of the inaugural one-day event in 2010. Attendance at over nine hundred, despite the uncompromising weather on Saturday afternoon, was significantly up on last year with many attending from well outside the district, particularly from Cumbria, including a couple from Holland who stayed over in the village. We hope the local business community benefited from the event.

With 36 Beers available under the watchful eye of Gordon Heal from The Northumberland Branch of CAMRA, together with a wine and cider bar, there was something to suit every taste.

The first beer to sell out was Tyneside Blond from Hadrian & Boarded Brewery. Food was provided by Kielder Organic Meats on Friday and by the team from local *WMH Fresh Farm Meats*, our main sponsor, on Saturday. Four teams from The Young Farmers' Clubs provided further entertainment by staging a Tug o' War, eventually won by Shaftoe who picked up the prize of £100 of INTERSPORT VOUCHERS, from Greggs Sport in Hexham

Backed this year by fifty sponsors and advertisers, figures which speak volumes for their confidence shown in this event, the six bands performing were exceptionally well received. Friday evening saw first a young band, *Lyrical Whisky*, followed by *Wreckage* with Phil Coats from Haydon Bridge on drums. The evening concluded with *Soul Doubt*, an astonishing 'Big Soul' sound, with Andrew Webster their lead singer. He was joined in an impromptu appearance by local Brendan Healy, who then provided a well-received version of "Mustang Sally"; all-in-all, a credit to home-grown musical talent!

The early evening entertainment on Saturday was provided by *Big Art Peters*, a well-established local band from Haltwhistle, preceded by a group of young musicians, *Eighty Eights*.

A VIEW FROM UP THERE

John Harrison

I promise I will get this thing about road signs out of my system sometime soon, but in the meantime, I'm sure that on road journeys you have broken the boredom by concocting alternative meanings for the many warning signs that decorate the verges. On journeys with our children many years ago I seem to recall coming across "man having difficulty with umbrella", "low flying motorbikes ahead", and "beware of giant milk-bottle ahead". But the other day I came across a warning for an un-gated rail crossing ahead – which portrayed a silhouette of a steam engine – clearly railway modernisation still has a few places to reach. In society we do tend to get stuck with familiar images – ask yourself – in a restaurant, how do you attract the attention of the staff at the other side of the room when you require the bill – I bet you hold one hand up in the air and mime a signature onto your palm – when was the last time that you simply 'signed' for a meal and had the cost placed on your account?

What a crazy summer this has been so far. In all my years as a professional climatologist, I don't believe that I ever experienced such a sharp drop in daytime temperature as occurred between Saturday June 3rd (24.5 degC) and Sunday 4th (12.1 degC). Added to the late ground frosts and the winds, my poor vegetable plants don't know what's going to hit them next. June was generally rather unsettled and cooler than usual. There was a wide range of fluctuation in temperature over the course of the month. After a cool start under heavy cloud the first few days promised well for a warm month with the daytime temperature exceeding 20 degC on both the 2nd and 3rd, but there was remarkable fall in temperature to 12 degC on the 4th and an exceptional 11.7 degC on the 5th. Daytime temperatures remained relatively low until the 25th due to a combination of cloud and a fresh breeze, although there were some pleasantly sunny days. From the 25th a brief warm spell saw temperatures exceed 20 degC on three consecutive days. In contrast, between the 6th and 12th there were localised ground frosts and those out just after dawn were greeted by white covering of hoar frost. Although the rainfall total for the month was well above the long-term average, much of this fell as showers, some of which were very intense. More prolonged rain fell on the 11th/12th, 18th and 22nd - my wife and I planned to go walking on the Wall from Steel Rigg on two of these – the 18th and 22nd – so you would obviously be on to a loser if you asked me for an accurate weather forecast!!!! Despite the rain, small watercourses were still running very low by the end of the month. Although less windy than May, the wind was a persistent feature which meant that conditions felt quite cool, even during longer sunny spells.

Village projects.

John Martin Heritage Festival.

The final events in the first stage of this eighteen month project are now completed. The writing workshop held at the garden station was particularly successful and had been fully booked since May. The second stage begins in September with a film animation weekend. (See page 12)

The Bridge Library.

Old Bridge Information Panel

English Heritage have now given their approval but permission is still awaited from NCC to place the Panel stand in the pavement on the approach to the Old Bridge. The licence to use a Bewick engraving of the bridge on the information panel is to be paid for by the Parish Council.

Claire's Newsagents has acquired the old bank building for business use and has requested Barclays to install an ATM in the wall from where the old one was removed by HSBC. There seems to have been little action by the Co-op regarding the ATM it said it was installing.

Strategic Toilets

The council was informed that the toilets in John Martin Street are most likely to be classed as 'strategic' by NCC. This means that they are used more by tourists and other visitors than by local people. It also means that their maintenance remains the responsibility of NCC rather than this being delegated to the Parish Council.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Thursday, 22nd September at 7.30 in the Community Centre.

“Blessed are you, Father,
Lord of heaven and earth,
For revealing the mysteries of the kingdom
To mere children.” Mt. 11.25.

What a lovely truth. And we put it in the pending tray and then it is business as usual. But...but...but...we now know that the brilliant child spends significant time daydreaming. This phenomenon, condemned by much of the adult world, registers the child's union with her true self. Then when it comes to, for example, academic practicalities the field is totally fertile. There are no obstacles. She is fully conscious. The daydreamer has no problem and the child is pronounced “brilliant”! Maybe, to be more accurate we should say “enlightened”. Because in the same way, if we live in the true self, and if we live by the truth at the core of our being, fully conscious and in the light of the Spirit, as with the “mere children”, the mysteries of the kingdom are revealed to us. We can even go universal and set no limits to God's mercy and compassion. It is for all. Meanwhile, in touch with our true self, the Spirit prays within us unceasingly. The Spirit takes us ever deeper into the mysteries of the kingdom. Where the wheat and the darnel grow side by side and there is no room for elitism. Where everyone is welcome, the good and the bad, the saint and the sinner. And the spread of the kingdom is irreversible, despite all presenting appearances to the contrary, with the breakdown of our society into complete insanity. We have no illusions of grandeur, no silly ideas that we have arrived. The kingdom is open in compassion to humanity, to the little ones, to those weak in faith, to those terribly in need of compassion. And for us the kingdom is now. 

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
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
