Parish Council notes from the meeting October 24, 2013.

Paul De Santis, head of commercial development at bus operator Arriva, attended alongside his colleague, depot manager David Brogan, to hear concerns of councillors and residents over the 685 bus service.

The issues, which were highlighted the previous month by members of the public, relate to health and safety on the new smaller buses operating on the route, and overcrowding, which means some people have to stand.

Mr. De Santis was also handed a petition from residents calling for improvements.

He said that the smaller buses were introduced in July, following complaints that services were breaking down, and that the buses were now much more reliable. In addition, because of their size and design, which enables them to accommodate wheelchairs, seating is limited.

Mr. Santis said that buying new larger coaches with wheelchair access could cost around £300,000 each, and would possibly lead to fare increases.

However, the Arriva representatives said they will listen to all concerns, and will look at ways in which they can improve the 685 service. This will include speaking to Stagecoach, which jointly operates the route, to improve ticketing.

Public highways.

Councillors discussed Land Ends Road, which currently has a 30mph speed limit. It was suggested that the speed limit should be reduced in the interests of safety.

Planning applications.

A planning application has been submitted for 22-24 Shaftoe Street Haydon Bridge, for listed building consent, internal refurbishment and alterations to fenestration.

The parish council will ask Northumberland County Council to ensure all conservation and listed building requirements are adhered to.

Play areas

Moves are afoot to make sure play equipment at The Showfield meets safety regulations. Cllr. Sharp reported that waste dumped nearby has now been removed.

Correspondence

Project developer Stuart Evans, who previously attended a meeting to discuss The Sill visitor centre, which is proposed to be built south of the B6318 road near Bardon Mill, is keen to provide an update on the project at the December meeting of the parish council. He will be invited to attend.

The parish council is seeking a suitable person to dig graves at the cemetery, and remove the burden of responsibility from James Dickinson. Cllr. Alan Sharp said it is not easy to find somebody to carry out relief grave digging, and that specialist skills and equipment are required.

Library

Cllr. Charlton said the library has been rewarded for the success of its book reading challenge for children during the summer holidays. It has received $\pounds 100$ for new books.

War memorial

A bayonet is expected to be installed at the war memorial in time for Remembrance Sunday, as a temporary measure.

The parish council is looking at grant funding for maintenance work to be carried out at the war memorial.

Phillip Larkin

Cllr. David Robson is keen to progress a scheme for a Blue Plaque, to mark poet Philip Larkin's association with a house on Ratcliffe Road. He will provide an update at next month's meeting.

Just not cricket.

Cllr. Sharp, who attends parish council meetings as the local county councillor, declared he will miss the November and December meetings. A keen cricketer, he is heading down under to watch the forthcoming test matches between Australia and England, in Perth and Melbourne.

Cllr. Sharp reported that £1,500 of Community Chest funding has been earmarked for a flood defence scheme near the football field. He is also hoping to help the cricket club purchase a new roller, with funding from the section 106 development fund

Cllr. Sharp reported that resurfacing work at Strother Close and Langley Gardens is ongoing, while drains are being cleared at the same time. The work should be completed within the next month, although he expressed disappointment that it could not be concluded sooner.

Trees on Church Street, between the church and the library, are set to be pruned. Cllr. Sharp outlined his determination to ensure drains on Church Street are cleared as soon as possible.

Cllr. Sharp said the road between Ridley Hall and Morralee Banks needs to be resurfaced, and said he is continuing to find a solution to the problem of school buses parking in a layby at the east end of Haydon Bridge.

The contribution that the Parish Council makes to the general welfare of our community is, I think, under appreciated by many. We are very fortunate to have a body of such able volunteers to conduct civil business on our behalf and they richly deserve our thanks. There is a vacancy on the council at present, which is unusual for Haydon Bridge.

150 NOT OUT : PART 6

I have followed the 150 year history of Haydon Bridge Cricket Club, in five parts from May to October 2013, in The Haydon News. This month, our cricketers will celebrate the 150 years with a special event at Langley Castle.

The years 1999 and 2000 brought League Championship success to Haydon Bridge First XI again after sixteen years.

The First Division K.O. Cup was also won in 2002 and, in 2002 and 2003 Haydon Bridge Juniors were crowned champions and won the Junior K.O. Cup in the same years.

Success continued for our First XI cricketers in 2006 (League), 2011 (League and K.O. Cup) and, of course, the League in 2013. The Second XI won the Second Division Championship in 2005.

The First XI got the **1999** season off to a ten point winning start at Humshaugh, but by only four runs. It was a surprise defeat of the reigning champions against an under strength Haydon Bridge side. Haydon Bridge: 111. N. Kendrew 25, J. Kirkup 21. Humshaugh: 107 for 5. B. Hope 2 - 43. Barry Hope's 2 for 43 figures don't tell the whole story, as Barry bowled an admirable unchanged spell that averaged only two runs per over.

After three games, Haydon Bridge First XI went six points clear above Haltwhistle at the top of the League by beating Allendale by 78 runs and winning three games out of three, twice earning a maximum 12 points. Haydon Bridge: 169 for 5. I Watson 80, R. Hines 58. Allendale: 91. K. Marshall 4 - 16.

In June, a fine bowling performance of 5 wickets for 5 runs in seven overs from young Paul Robson, against Chopwell, helped keep Haydon Bridge at the top of the League. Chopwell: 107.

Haydon Bridge: 111 - 4. P. Telfer 49 n.o.

One week later, in what was described in the local press as 'an epic battle', against the champions Humshaugh at Haydon Park, Humshaugh batted first and made 151 for 3; Kevin Marshall bowling sixteen overs, his one wicket costing only 34 runs.

The game looked to be going Humshaugh's way, in spite of Ian Watson's 60 runs, as the innings drew to a close but Captain Richard Hines 'smashed the leather off the ball' scoring 21 not out with a big six to finish the game off with five balls to spare.

Humshaugh: 151 - 3. Haydon Bridge: 153 - 6.

Maybe it was at this point that Haydon Bridge First XI felt they could achieve League success again.

Against Haltwhistle on June 19th, rain stopped play with Haydon Bridge needing 57 off 37 overs, but the match is worth a mention because of K. Marshall's bowling figures. Kevin took 7 wickets for 22 runs. One week later, the First XI went ten points ahead of Wylam at the top of the League with nine games played, after a big win against Allendale when 12 points were achieved with one ball to spare when Barry Hope took the final Allendale wicket.

Haydon Bridge: 187 - 5. Watson 38, Kendrew 38, John Kirkup 40. Allendale: 119.

A Hexham Courant report of the game is as interesting for its description of the Haydon Park crowd as for the match itself:

'The persistence of Barry Hope saw the last wicket fall to the delight of the crowd who, it must be said, looked more like a cast from The Last of the Summer Wine T.V. programme.' Were you there?

In spite of a defeat at North Tyne Riverdale, by the end of July our village First XI were fourteen points ahead of nearest challengers, Chopwell, following wins over Wylam, Stocksfield, Chopwell and Humshaugh; who Haydon Bridge beat by 15 runs with Kevin Marshall taking a hat trick of wickets, all clean bowled in the penultimate over.

Wylam: 87. K. Marshall 5 - 32. Haydon Bridge: 91 for 6. I. Watson 27.

Haydon Bridge: 153 declared. Adrian Clark 50 n.o. Stocksfield: 135.

R. Stephenson 5 - 27, K. Marshall 5 - 36.

Chopwell: 177. K. Marshall 4 -65. Haydon Bridge: 180 for 7. I. Watson 76.

On August 14th 1999, our First XI lost to Haltwhistle and only seven points separated the two teams at the top of the League, but brilliant batting by Ian Watson 90 n.o. and Neil Kendrew 94 saw Haydon Bridge (258 for 2) back to their best in a win over Allendale (126) K. Marshall 4 - 27.

Haltwhistle was the only team that could stop Haydon Bridge winning what was now the Nat West Tyne League. Our First XI needed only four points to secure the title for the first time in sixteen years, however, and they gained a maximum twelve points defeating Chopwell by 53 runs. In 2000, the cricket season got off to a winning start for Haydon Bridge First XI, against North Tyne Riverdale, as they set about defending their title.

Haydon Bridge batted first, I. Watson carrying on his good form from the previous season with 39 runs. A low total of only 109 for 7 should have been within reach of Riverdale, but with their first six batsmen all out for only 20 runs and all out for 60 in the thirty fifth over, Haydon Bridge recorded a victory thanks to their bowlers.

K. Marshall 3 - 11, P. Robson 2 - 5, R. Stephenson 3 - 17

The First team were shocked at Haltwhistle in the second game, when the home side won by 62 runs in spite of John Kirkup scoring 43. (Haydon Bridge 111 - 9) They were soon back on track, however, with a 112 run victory at Stocksfield.

Haydon Bridge: 191 for 6 wickets. P. Telfer 57, R. Stephenson 40.

Stocksfield were 79 all out in an innings in which the Haydon Bridge bowling was outstanding. Paul Robson took 2 wickets for 4 runs in 7 overs, 6 of which were maidens, along with Kevin Marshall with figures of 2 wickets for 15 runs and Robert Stephenson 3 for 14.

Haydon Bridge went above Allendale into second place in the League after beating our neighbours by 47 runs, and then Riverdale by 6 wickets.

A feature of the two games was Barry Hope's splendid bowling figures as he took six wickets in each mach.

Haydon Bridge: 154 for 10 wickets. R, Hines 46, J. Kirkup 60. Allendale: 107 - 10. B. Hope 12-2-40-6 wickets.

Riverdale: 134. B. Hope 4-3-0-30-6 wickets.

Haydon Bridge: 135 for 4 wickets.

P. Gibson 33 not out and Richard Hines 14 not out rounded off the innings.

Our First XI were trailing Haltwhistle by eleven points in second place, and the game at Haydon Park on June 24th against the leaders was of special significance, but with Neil Kendrew carrying his bat for an unbeaten century, he almost single handedly destroyed the Haltwhistle attack, in 29 overs with twenty fours and one six, and Haltwhistle were beaten by 9 wickets.

The next week, Matfen also defeated the leaders and Haydon Bridge moved to the top of the table by two points after a remarkable tied game against Stocksfield when, with 31 runs required off 3 overs, Brian Ray came to Haydon Bridge's rescue with two 6s and one 4 in an innings of 33 not out, and a tense finish saw the teams share the points.

Stocksfield: 131 for 4 wickets.

Robson 6 - 48, Hope 4 - 42.

Haydon Bridge: 131 for 7 wickets. B. Reay 33 n.o.

In a Haydon Bridge victory by 23 runs over Wylam, on July 22nd 2000, Kevin Marshall took a magnificent 7 wickets for 11 runs in a ten over spell, including 6 maidens. In reply to our First XI's 139 runs for 9, Matfen were bowled out for 50 runs. Two weeks later, Haydon Bridge's attack were at it again, bowling out Stocksfield for 47, Kevin taking 4 for 17, Paul Robson 3 for 14 in six overs, and Barry Hope 2 wickets for 0 runs in three balls of his second over. In Haydon Bridge's total of 195, Paul Gibson scored 81.

A Haydon Bridge defeat by 4 wickets against North Tyne on September 9th, saw Haltwhistle overtaking our first team at the top of the League by two points. So the title was at stake when the two old rivals met for the final game of the season.

Put in to bat, Haydon Bridge made a disastrous start losing three early wickets. However, Ian Watson (29) and Richard Hines (20) steadied the batting and an explosive 25 from Brian Ray, including three 6s, gave the innings a boost; although still totalling a modest 114.

Haydon Bridge had made a bad start but Haltwhistle were even worse and Kevin Marshall (3 - 36) and Paul Robson (4 - 27) reduced them to only 12 runs for 5 wickets and 105 all out.

In a nail biting climax to the 2000 season, Haydon Bridge had pipped Haltwhistle to the title by just 9 runs and recorded their second championship in successive seasons.

By my reckoning this was the ninth time a Haydon Bridge First XI had won the League during the Club's history. It was a bright start to the new millennium for our cricketers and, maybe, an appropriate date on which to close this chapter of the Club's achievements.

I have followed the history of Haydon Bridge Cricket Club from its beginnings in 1863 to the year 2000 and although there are more successes to come for our First XI, Second XI and Juniors in 2002, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2011 and 2013, I'll leave the telling of that story until a later date.

Now I'm off to Langley Castle to celebrate a wonderful 150 year history and a twelfth First XI Championship success in 2013, at the Haydon Bridge Cricket Club's Annual Dinner.

REMARKABLE SCORING

There are many unsung volunteers associated with village clubs and societies, and the Haydon Bridge Cricket Club is no different in that respect. For example: the club's officials and officers during the 150 years, the ladies who make the interval teas a feature of a pleasant afternoon at Haydon Park, the umpires who officiate so diligently, those who help prepare the wicket and the outfield, and etc., etc. There is one volunteer at Haydon Bridge, however, who deserves a special mention.

I know the lady in question will not be pleased with me for recording her contribution, preferring to remain 'unsung'. The story of Haydon Bridge Cricket Club would not be complete however - and nor would the records of batting and bowling without recalling the remarkable support given to our cricketers by Audrey Bowman (nee Milburn), our village Cricket Club's scorer for over sixty three years.

Audrey started scoring for the Haydon Bridge 2nd XI after leaving school in the late 1940s and going with a friend to watch Haydon Bridge in a cricket match at Hexham, against the GPO. She then followed John Corbett as the official First XI Scorer and continues in the role to this day. A quite wonderful commitment and one that is, and has been, appreciated by everyone involved in Haydon Bridge Cricket Club for more than six decades.

HISTORY IS ALL AROUND US Wherever you go in our parish there are memories of its heritage.



I am reliably informed that this historic post box with a V R cipher and Crown was moved from its original position at **Haydon Park** to the top of the **North Bank** for the benefit of our former resident and **Chief Constable of** Newcastle upon Tyne, Fred Crawley Esq., who lived at Hill House.

ANCIENT OR MODERN ?

Keen eved fisherman Harry Steele has pointed out to me that this summer's low rainfall and river levels have uncovered signs of an historic causeway or ford, laid across the River Tyne below Temple Houses. This interesting feature has been created from large sculptured blocks of stone, each with two holes fashioned into the surface.



The questions are: What is the significance of this **River Type feature?** Is it connected to the gravel extraction of recent years or is there an earlier explanation? What do you think?

HAYDON BRIDGE WAR MEMORIAL by Pam and Ken Linge

We continue our series of articles on those individuals who died in the Great War. The biographies are published chronologically and the thirty second casualty, in 1917, was **Rvde Guild Rayner**

Ryde served as Second Lieutenant, 4th Battalion, Northumberland Fusiliers. He died on 26th October 1917, aged 26.

Born in Chirton, he was the only son of Henry Manning Rayner and Eleanor Rayner (nee Peverell). A chorister and rugby player he later worked in South Africa for the British American Tobacco Co.

Ryde served in the Colonial Forces at the beginning of the war, and fought against the Germans in South West Africa. He married Freda May Bohler of Johannesburg in November 1915. They had one child.

As well as having his name on the War Memorial and the Reredos in St. Cuthbert's, Ryde is also commemorated on the memorials in the Shaftoe School and Tynedale Rugby Club and on his parents' gravestone in Haydon Bridge.

Ryde's son Lieutenant Gerald Douglas Rayner, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, Royal Canadian Infantry Corps, died in the fighting in Normandy on 18th July 1944, aged 28.

Photos and drawings - the paper publication is always in black and white but the on-line version is in colour. Do bear this in mind when submitting items. The higher the resolution, the better.

ADVERTS

Starting in 2014 we will also be standardising the advert sizes. All advertisers will be getting an invitation to renew soon, showing the new arrangements.

In essence: adverts will be whole page, 1/2 page, 1/4 page, 1/8th page, 1/16th page or 1/32nd page. For 1/2 and 1/16th page items the orientation can be either portrait or landscape.

Creating adverts is a squillion pound industry. Doing it well is not as easy as it looks. Generally speaking, at the sort of sizes we are discussing here, *less is more*. A VIEW FROM UP THERE

In their bid to recruit new members, church noticeboards can provide a rich source of unintended doublemeaning. I read the other day of a church in Yorkshire whose invitation draped across the wrought iron gates reads "All are welcome in God's house – these are indeed the gates to heaven". What was obviously not noticed was a faded sign of some vintage at the base of the gates which read "These gates are closed during the winter". You can come to your own conclusions !!

The gates to winter stand open and the world around us starts planning for the winter switch-off. As the days grow shorter the ground surface begins to cool. Because of the warm(er) summer there is still a fair amount of heat left in the ground so frost has not been a problem so far this autumn. But cooling is relentless and it will take only a few cloud-free nights to take the temperature down towards 0 degC. Over the previous three years the first air frost has been on October 17th (2010), November 6th (2011) and September 23rd (2012). Because the air cools from below, ground frosts are likely to have occurred well before these dates.

September was an unsettled and variable month. Cloudy skies leading to cooler days and lack of air frosts. The first three days were blustery but there were lengthy sunny spells over the first five days, with daytime temperatures close to 20 degC. But autumn took control, snuffing out any hope of a late summer. Very unsettled weather moved in during the early hours of the 6th, which was extremely wet (44 mm).

After the rain, the weather was a mixture of sunshine and occasional showers, some of which were moderately heavy. There was, however, sufficient dryness to allow the harvests to be gathered. Another cyclonic system moved in on the 15th heralding four very breezy days with occasional rain. With the wind moving round to a more easterly direction from the 19th onwards, the weather became rather dank and dismal with some exceptionally gloomy days. Early morning mist and fog cleared only rarely, and gloomy conditions persisted on some days.
