NOTES OF THE HAYDON PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING HELD ON 24th MARCH 1983

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting held on 25th March 1982 were read and approved. There was no business to discuss at the last meeting and therefore no matters arising.

Public participation

Mrs Thompson raised the question of the speed of traffic and overtaking on the A69 road through the village. The Chairman stated that these matters had been drawn to the attention of the police and Cllr. Tait remarked that regular patrols were now taking place. He stated that there was no likelihood of the existing pelican crossing being resited or a further crossing provided to the east of the river bridge. The Parish Council had done as much as they could bearing in mind they were not a highway authority. More support was needed from other bodies. Mrs Thompson was far from satisfied, particularly from the point of view of children and elderly persons having to cross the road in the vicinity of Martins Close. However the Council reiterated that much had already been done, including the road marking to prevent overtaking and little further was possible as far as the Parish was concerned. The question would of course be kept in mind.

Mrs Heslop mentioned that often the minor roads in the village were subjected to speeding and 'racetrack' antics, both on four wheels and two. The Council noted and would have the matter looked at.

There being no further business the Annual Meeting was closed.

NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - 24th MARCH 1983

Public participation

Mrs Thompson expressed pleasure in the news that the village was at last to have a library. Mr Waite mentioned that possession of the premises can be taken by Northumberland County Council probably at the end of April/beginning of May. The lease from British Rail would run for 15 years and not 25 years as might have been previously stated.

## Matters arising

A document concerning the future strategy relating to Hadrian's Wall was in circulation. The primary interest for parishes concerned footpaths.

Junior cricket coaching sessions continued to take place in the Sports Hall, supported by Shaftoe Trust. A further cricket coaching scheme was to be run at the Sports Hall by Tynedale District Council.

## Highways

The pothole in the road at Tofts Farm will be repaired. The street lamps will be cleaned and the school warning sign in Shaftoe Street will be fixed. No further word from British Telecom concerning the leaning telegraph pole.

## Tynedale District Council Matters

The unoccupied advanced factory in the Station Yard will be advertised to let on the open market with firms tendering on a fixed rental. The Council has waived rates of £150 on the factories in order to assist in continuing occupation.

The footpath to Esp Hill had been improved at some expense.

## Planning applications

Extensions to Haydon Bridge High School. Plans shown to the Councillors.

## Correspondence

Parish Council has donated £5 to the Keep Britain Tidy body.

Citizen's Advice Bureau do not require further funds this year for providing staff over and above normal. Thanks received for past support which might again be needed in the future.

Parish will contribute £25 to the Community Council as in the past.

Northumbria Police Authority has earmarked certain areas to try out a liaison scheme suggested after the Brixton disturbances. It will aim to promote better understanding and relationships between police and public. The Heaham sub-Division of Tynedale is one of the chosen areas and the Parish will ask for papers with a view to nominating Cllrs. Bates and Templer.

## Other matters

Mr Pumphrey raised the question of the sale of land at the east end of the Station Cottages and in particular the building on the edge of the land, used as a washhouse by the occupier of one of the cottages who wished to retain the use of the building. It was stated that the structure in question was not in the Council's ownership and therefore should not be affected by the sale of land. The question will be looked at further.

Nomination papers for the local elections in May are available from the Clerk to the Council - Mrs C. Swaddle.

## PARISH COUNCIL ELECTION

All the members of Haydon Parish Council have to be newly elected on 5th May 1983. Your present Councillors are Messrs. T.H. Bates, J.W. Drydon, A.C. Beniams, J. Wardle, M. Rumney, E. Waite, R. Tait, A. Duncan, J.M. Pumphrey, P. Templer and Mrs M. Porteous.

Mr. Duncan has resigned and left the village. Mr Pumphrey has decided not to stand again. Mr. Templer is a co-opted member. Assuming that all the others stand again, there are already three unfilled seats.

But there can be any number of candidates, and all the seats, not just the three vacancies, have to be filled afresh, choosing from all the available candidates.

If you feel you want to stand as a candidate get your Nomination Paper from the Returning Officer of Tynedale District Council in Hexham House. Broadly speaking, you are eligible if you are over 21 and have lived in the Parish for more than a year. You need two other people with similar qualifications to sign as Proposer and Secunder of your nomination. Finally you must get the completed Nomination Paper back to the Returning Officer by NOON on 9th April.

The Friends of Haydon Bridge will make sure that all the voters in the village can find out the names of the validly nominated candidates well before Polling Day, 5th May. Having found out, go and cast your votes!

## HELP YOURSELF TO HEALTH

Five years after ordination in 1950, Jack Burton was confronted by a woman who demanded that he should heal her, as he was a Minister of Christ. This fanned a glowing ember within his mind that the work of the Church was intended to bring health and healing to mankind. From that point his Ministry became more and more involved in the discovery and practice of healing through meditation and the Laying-on-of-Hands.

From Plymouth, where doctors had begun to send patients to his Advisory Centre, he moved to a parish in Torquay. After eighteen months, the then Bishop of Exeter dedicated a chapel to Christ the Healer, where Jack Burton held healing services at least twice a week. These gradually became a well known focal point to which people travelled from many parts of the world for healing.

In 1968, he established a charity and bought a hotel in Torquay which became a home of healing and a centre where clergy and lay folk could learn more of the healing work of Christ. He has now moved this work to Manor House, Coffinswell, Newton Abbot, which is in a rural setting four miles from Torquay.

His Ministry of Health and Healing has taken him to many parts of the British Isles and to places as far apart as the USA and Finland.

He has written a really usable book entitled "Help Yourself to Health" - and now he is booked to come to Haydon Bridge.

You should have an opportunity to see and hear Rev. Jack Burton on Tuesday 19th April 1983 when, God willing, he will be speaking at the Haydon Bridge Methodist Church - the meeting to commence at 7.30 pm.

WILLIAM S. HALL of STATION HOUSE: A TRIBUTE

Bill Hall came to Haydon Bridge seventeen years ago as Station Master - when the stations on the Tyne Valley line were something to be proud of - and he and his wife and daughter lived alongside the line, in the house which absorbed the noise and the vibrations of passenger trains and freight traffic, day and night. After British Rail down-graded Haydon Bridge to an unmanned halt, Bill became a travelling Inspector, and later finished his life-long service on the railways in charge of the Lost Property office in Newcastle, retiring in 1975.

In retirement he was able to enjoy his love of cricket and was Chairman of the Haydon Bridge Cricket Club for several years. He also enjoyed an occasional outing to the races, and the pleasure he took in a modest win was regarded as a bonus to be relished.

But it was in his quiet, unassuming service to the Parish Church in Haydon Bridge that Bill Hall will be remembered with gratitude by members of the church for many years to come. He became Assistant Treasurer and Secretary of the P.C.C, and Free Will Offering Secretary in 1971, and Churchwarden in 1972 until his death last month. He was also one of our representatives on the Deanery Synod, and took over the day-to-day running of the Church Hall when Mr. Ron Marshall had to give up for health reasons.

Yet by far the greatest contribution Bill Hall made to the Church in Haydon Bridge - despite his many jobs, done willingly and well - was his regular and unfailing attendance at the worship of the Parish Church, two or three times every Sunday; an example which few people can claim to equal in these days of casual attendance and indifferent commitment to Christian worship and Church life.

One practical consequence of his Christian faith was his kindness and concern for older members of our community; and his visits to their homes, with a gift of his own baking, will be greatly missed by all of them. We shall miss his presence amongst us but thank God for "a good and faithful servant". May he enter the joy of his Lord!

Morning Ossie," said Sammy as he got up from his seat and dug deep into his pocket to pay for the half lager that Ossie usually drinks. "By - what's happened to thuw - had a win on the Horses?" said Jean with a laugh as she passed Sammy his change. "Very kind of you, Samuel," replied Ossie as he took the vacant seat especially left for him, for after all he is the President of the Saturday Morning Club and Sammy, being Vice-President, knew full well that it was the right and proper thing that only a gentleman should honour his President with the drink of his palate - his lager - the rest of the Club didn't matter, they were only the peasants.

By now most of the members had arrived and the crack was well under way along with the two domino boards going. Landlord came waffling in, in his spotless white shirt and blue wool waistcoat, and threw another bucket of coals on the fire ... his motto "keep them warm, they'll stay longer; get them hot, they'll sup stronger," and with a broad grin he shuffled off again as he heard the till bell ring.

"Howay then, what's the crack?" said one of the members, dribbling his beer down the front of his Littlewoods shirt in anticipation, "Howay, git on wi..." "Had yer weesht -- Nuw, as I was saying," said the President as all ears became attuned to what he was going to say, "Ah, ah, ah, ah" - for by the chuckle in his voice this had to be hot line stuff. For a moment Ossie kept them in suspense while he took a long sip from his glass. "Howay, git on with it, man," spluttered John Haytor as he put his pint down, for after all he had been appointed head reporter to the Club, alongside Charles Thompson, both bringing in news of the week for Club members to digest over their pints. Now being the introvert and non-gregarious type that I am, I kept my distance but still could not help overhearing what was being said. At that moment the bar door opened and in swept Clifflie, with a blast of rain. Now Clifflie, being an old established member of the Club, takes no active part, apart from digesting well the information gleaned and explaining to the two reporters the big words used by the President, for after all Clifflie is a scholar, a learned man and a gentleman - a person with whom a most sensible conversation can be had.

By now the gem that the President had told was drowned in cries of "Git away." "Haddaway - is that reet?" "Sheee - Ah wad niver athowt it," when one of the members blurted out "HEOR, HLIV YER HORD ABCOT BUTCHER - he's givin' away free rum on a Saturday morning." "Wie says that?" chirped up Sammy. One of the reporters pointed his finger up towards the ceiling of the bar. "Uhey, hor upstairs," says he, "She peeps fra ahint the cortins and seed some prominent people stannin' aboot the shop drinking rum - while Butcher just stands there wid a broad grin on his face as his woman appears from behind the new wine bar with a wiggle of her hips and a tray of well-filled glasses. It's said he's gonna open a wine bar in the spring," said reporter Haytor.

That's what he said," says Sammy, in all seriousness. "Is dat so - is dat so," says Dennis, just as the Landlady makes her appearance and shouts, "Come on, you lovely people - LET'S HAVE YOUR GLASSES OFF."

And as I stood in Butcher's, enjoying a large glass of rum while womenfolk bought good cuts of beef for the weekend, I watched the members of the Saturday Morning Club scuttling out of both doors and vanishing in the wet of the afternoon.
