Parish Council Pickings (2nd September 1983)

Eight Councillors and the Clerk were present: the three absentees were duly represented by apologies.

Before the meeting proper got under way, Councillors were addressed by a Mr. Charlton from Newbrough. He told them about a new Community Enterprise scheme organised with Government (that is to say, Manpower Services Commission) backing by Community Rural Aid Ltd. This company operates from the Station Yard at Corbridge (telephone 3344) and its ambition is to provide services to the elderly and disabled population of Haydon Bridge, Newbrough, Langley and Fourstones such as gardening, decorating and home visiting, such work to be done by people currently unemployed. If anybody wants either to receive or give such services, it is probably worthwhile getting in touch with the organisers.

It was reported that the police had lurked about for 20 days with a radar trap at various points west of the village. Results disappointing. No heavy lorries caught, just the occasional motorist not doing more than 40 mph, and therefore let off with a warning. The reappearance of the white lines on the road at Peelwell was noted with some gratification: now people are asking for some more at Tofts! Usage of the new bridge at Ridley Hill by heavy vehicles is being watched with a view to putting up some discouraging road signs. It is also understood that work is to be done to upgrade the Joicey Lane bridge to 5-tonnes capacity.

The Council was pleased to accept Mr. Peter Brown's offer to revarnish a memorial seat free of charge.

Planning applications related to the conversion of Langley Castle to a guest house, plus extension of the Lodge. The empty shop next to the Co-op is to be turned back into a private house, and Peelwell Farm is to become a rest home.

Councillors were somewhat taken aback by a request from a resident for official permission to park a vehicle on the pavement. He claimed that such permission had been given informally some years ago, and now wanted it confirmed. The Council decided, reasonably enough, to inform the resident that they had no power to authorise him to park illegally.

Finally it was reported that United Bus wishes to reduce further the frequency of its Heddon-Longate-Allendale services. The Council agreed to write to Mr. Derwent Gibson (County Councillor) to express their concern at any further reduction in the already attenuated rural bus service.

"TWELFTH NIGHT" - Northumberland Theatre Company at Haydon Bridge High School

What a pity there wasn't a better turn-out for this marvellously original production! "Twelfth Night" is always hilarious, but I'd never seen anything quite like this before. On an ingeniously designed set, the whole of which would fit comfortably into an average-sized garden shed, the players performed drunken rollickings, fight scenes, and even managed to ride a bicycle!

Shaun Prendergast was wonderfully pompous as Malvolio, and Decca Wright made a gloriously brazen Maria, but it was one member of the cast who deserved special praise, it was Kenneth Gardner as Feste. He was thoroughly convincing as the sycophantic yet human clown, and his singing was a joy. "O Mistress Mine", sung to the beat of a bongo drum (another of Mr. Gardner's talents) takes a bit of getting used to, but it worked very well in the tropical island setting, and added to the freshness and novelty of the production.

Shakespeare, done badly, can be very tedious, but Shakespeare done well is a delight, and this was a happy evening, full of fun. The only fault I would find was with the

seating. "Twelfth Night" is a long play, and the hard schoolroom chairs were making the audience a bit restless towards the end. Still, it's lovely to be able to go out and see a good production of a marvellous play without having to travel far beyond your own doorstep. I hope the NTC will be back in Haydon Bridge soon, and I hope that next time there'll be a bigger audience to appreciate their work.

Dear Editor,

I would like, through the courtesy of the Haydon News, to explain why I am very strongly opposed to an organisation called Community Rural Aid, or to give it its full and proper title "COMMUNITY RURAL AID LTD".

This seemingly laudable organisation is a Limited Company set up and funded by the Government using taxpayers' money to be seen to be doing something about unemployment, except creating it and elderly and handicapped people, except reducing the financial allocation allotted to their proper care.

The Company has Directors and a Chief Executive, who draws a salary of £70,000 p.a. plus car and other expenses, and Local Organisers who go round elderly and handicapped people to ask them what help they would like. These local organisers receive a salary of £9,000 p.a. for what must be the biggest part-time sinecure going.

On the other hand the Government is slashing the funding to Health and Social Services to an extent which is already curtailing services to patients and will do so much more in the future in spite of Mrs Thatcher's honeyed phrases about "increased spending in real terms". In real effect services are being drastically cut unless, of course, you happen to want a job with "Community Rural Aid Ltd" or the like.

Apart from being a cruel kick in the teeth for the many very genuine people who freely give their time, energy and money to the real support of the elderly and handicapped, this is, to my mind a most hypocritical and callous Governmental propaganda whitewash and deserves full public exposure as such.

A Preliminary Meeting was held on 30th June 1983 at 7.30 pm in the Methodist Chapel Hall. This was a gathering of people interested in forming a youth club.

Everyone expressed their willingness to help and out of this the first fund raising event, "A Sponsored Walk", was organised for 3rd July.

The route planned started at Whetstone Bridge, Hemlow, and the children and adults were ferried from Haydon Bridge by a band of willing car owners. With great enthusiasm (bearing in mind the day was bright and sunny), 17 children and 12 adults set off at a startling pace. The wiser ones volunteered to ensure there were no stragglers.

At Lowgate refreshments were available courtesy of Ruth Smith's Mobile Car Boot Cafe, dispensing orange juice: all had a well earned rest. The pace slowed down as we set off in the direction of Elrington road end. Midway between Lowgate and Elrington Ethel Mason and Avril Harker provided an excellent first aid back-up for those suffering from heat exhaustion, blisters and gnat bites. Every attempt to record their presence on film was thwarted by a quick turn of the head. "Ernie Tewart (thought) he got them!" So we arrived at Elrington road end where Ruth's Car Boot Cafe came into operation again.

From this point onwards we lost one member of the party. There suddenly appeared on the horizon a green Scab, which did a quick U-turn and vanished as quickly as it had come. While Roy Phillipson was handing out chocolate bars someone was heard to comment that Bobby Todd had vanished!!

Having lost one member of the party we decided to change the route. Turning sharp left we gathered our troupes and marched steadfastly on towards Elrington. Coming over the old bridge we realised that despite Bobby Todd's mysterious departure, his sister Dorothy was ready to repeat the experience.

As all our gallant band departed for their homes, we hoped that our efforts had raised about £70. However due to the generosity of village support a grand total of £186 provided us with a good basis for our new Youth Club.

So far the Youth Club has had 10 meetings in the Chapel Hall. Activities have been table tennis, darts, volleyball, photography and various table games. Permanent features include a tuck shop and disco. We have been well supported and the average membership is 10 in the age range 7-9 years, and 25 children over 10 years.

Unfortunately at the moment a condition of membership has to be that each child is a regular member of the Methodist Sunday School. New members are always welcome.
