Parish Council Pickings

(June 7)

Following Mr. Fred Brown's resignation as a Parish Councillor, notices were put up inviting any ten residents to call for an election to fill the vacancy. Nobody did so. The Council was therefore entitled to fill the seat by co-option, which it did by nominating Mrs Enid Garrow of Springfield, Fourstones Road, to the vacant place. Mrs Garrow had only a handful fewer votes than Mr. Brown at the election in May last year.

Mrs Philp reported that she had not had any opportunity to talk to Mr. Rippon about the bypass, but had written to him. The consultants' study is now in progress and the Council decided to wait and see what came out of that. Mr Gordon Adam, the member of the European Parliament, thinks that EEC funds should be available for the improvement of the A69 generally.

The library was duly opened on 19 June and is proving a popular amenity. Opening hours are Tuesdays 10.00 to 12.30 and 1.30 to 5.00
Thursdays 1.30 to 5.00 and 5.30 to 7.30.

Among the planning applications, Mr. Heslop at Cruelsike asked to be allowed to do light engineering in his outbuildings, and there was a request for permission to build a house on spare land at The Craggs, North Bank. One councillor raised the question whether the first application would create unwelcome noise or additional traffic, but these matters were left for the District Planning Officer to worry about.

Otherwise the discussion was about small housekeeping matters - litter bins, sweeping the subway, replacing signs, repairing footpaths. All part of the endless struggle to keep the village looking as if somebody cares about its appearance.

More Pickings (19 July 1984) ..

Mrs Garrow was duly co-opted to the Council and that gave an attendance of six out of eleven. One other Councillor sent a formal apology.

Mrs Philp has tried to follow up her letter to Mr. Rippon by personal telephone calls, but the best she has been able to achieve is the promise of an appointment on his next round of constituency visits. It was agreed to reimburse Mrs Philp for the cost of telephone calls already made.

Tynedale District has been persuaded to visit the underpass to do some sweeping once every three weeks. This will be additional to the somewhat inadequate attention paid by the County's clearing department.

Final closure of the Newbrough tip is planned for 1st September, and with it the "Civic Amenity" which allows individuals to dump their own rubbish there personally. The Council decided to represent to the County Council that the Civic Amenity as presented ought to be retained - and since this would help to protect other highly vulnerable areas of the parish from dumping, eg. the riverside. There is in fact no need for people to go dumping their bulky waste wherever they can when nobody is looking - the District Council runs a free collection service, but they only collect when it suits them.

Most of the planning applications were for the continuation of things people are already doing on temporary consent, but there was some discussion about Mrs Bowes' application for outline permission for a house at Foxton, North Bank.

No doubt it can be regarded as "infalling" between there and the Peelwell group of houses, but some felt that the eventual loss of the open views from the North Bank might be regretted. Nevertheless, the matter was left to the District Council without formal comment.

The County Council is charged with producing a definitive map of public rights of way. The question of Temple Houses lane was raised, and the Council agreed to re-submit its view that a right of way exists, but also to remind the residents of their rights of objection.

Northumbrian Water Authority also has a job to do - this one is to produce a register of water sources for use in a war emergency. As they had no control over private sources prior to 1965, they have asked the Parish Council to do a survey for them of all wells, springs, boreholes and pumps. The Council felt this request was pretty unreasonable, and the Chairman will raise the matter at the Consumers' Panel, of which he is a member.

No meeting in August. The next report will cover the events of 27 September 1984.

Haydon Bridge Community Association

The Association's Annual General Meeting was held on Monday 25 June when the chair was taken by the President, Mr. Edward Waite.

The President invited members to observe a period of silence in memory of two of the Association's leading members, John B. Bowes (Chairman) and Alan Moffatt (Hon. Auditor)

Mr. G. Johnson, Hon. Treasurer, in presenting his report, pointed out that the revised hire charges appeared to be in order but stressed the point that without the sum of £1337 raised by the Watson family, the accrued credit balance of £1594 carried forward at 31.3.84 would have been considerably reduced.

The meeting agreed to continue the scale of charges for a further year. Each Club to be affiliated to the Association at an annual fee of £10.

The President proposed and the meeting approved that a Vote of Thanks to all Officers of the Association, Play Group leaders and Mr. P. Brown be recorded in the Minutes of the Meeting. The Meeting also asked that the Association's Vote of Thanks to the Watson family be recorded in the Minutes.

Mr. Watson reported on improvements to the car park and pointed out that he had received considerable support from Messrs. Keith Dodd, R. Curry, T. Baugh, J. Smith, D. Smith, J. Wardle, M. Cousins, K. Tulip, P. Watson and other kind helpers. A vote of thanks was recorded.

Certain suggestions were put forward for the Committee to consider. Included in the list were

- a) improvements to the roof of the entrance hall
- b) attention to outside lighting
- c) possible fitting of a cut-off valve in order to save money on heating charges
- d) re-decorating of committee room
- e) attention to ventilation in main hall
- f) purchase of plates.

It was reported that Mr. Waite had purchased a set of Bowls and a carpet suitable for use by an indoor Bowls Club. He had presented these articles to the Community Association to be used by a Bowls Club affiliated to the Association.

Mrs. T. Dodgson was thanked for her work as leader of the Association's Play Group and it was agreed to advertise for a successor. A sub-Committee comprising Messrs L.C. Coombes and E. Waite together with Miss R. Robinson and Mrs T. Dodgson was appointed to interview applicants and if possible to make an appointment.

It was agreed to hold a Committee Meeting on Monday 23rd July. The President stressed the point that the Committee would require a new Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

Northumberland Theatre Company

After the success of "Twelfth Night" in the village last autumn, the company's professional touring theatre company, NTC, is returning to Haydon Bridge.

This time it is bringing a new musical comedy, "Fair Shares", to the Community Centre. Bursting with songs, jokes and all the excitement of the old time music hall, the show is great summer entertainment for the whole family.

Written specially for the NTC by Shaun Prendergast, "Fair Shares" takes an affectionate look at one of the North-East's great institutions, the Co-op. All the characters in the play are employees and it is when they decide to mount a show to entertain their colleagues that the fun starts.

The show has already been all over Northumberland and Tyneside and the performance in Haydon Bridge will be one of the last of the tour. The Northumberland Gazette also liked the show. "Superb entertainment ... brought the house down", they said.

The tickets, from John Clarke's newagents or from W & M Marsh, are £2 for adults and £1.50 for children and senior citizens. A Pleasant Walk

Dear Editor

The Ministry of Transport probably receive few praises for improving the environment yet we have, on our doorstep, an example where they have done just that, albeit probably unwittingly.

Take a walk along the old Bush Bends road, starting at the Haydon Spa end. After crossing the bridge taking a culvert down to the South Tyne, notice the common BISTORT grass on your left opposite a wooded patch where young beech trees whose leaves have been damaged, possibly by a late frost (many other beeches seem to have been similarly blighted in our area this year). Notice young ash trees that have seeded themselves at the verge of the old road and the yellow flowers of the HAWKWEED family scattered about. Now, on your left a steep embankment which was bare scree only a few years ago is being colonised by clover, bird's foot trefoil, eyebright and many other wild flowers.

At the end of this embankment, where remains of an old bridge starts, a track leads up towards the main A69. Walk, up this track a few yards and then turn east through a patch of horsetail - possibly a remnant of the giant ferns that grew here 300,000,000 years ago when our coal seams were being formed in what was then tropical forest - keeping about halfway, or a bit less, up the embankment slope and you arrive at a sheltered patch of the most lovely English wild flowers you will have seen for some time, including the NORTHERN MARSH ORCHIDS which like moist, sheltered places. Tread carefully and don't pick any. Let them stay and, hopefully, flourish and spread.

What an example of the power of nature, left alone, to colonise and beautify the land.

If you continue your walk to the Hexham end of this bit of redundant roadway, which the Ministry of Transport have promised to leave as a public footpath for us to enjoy, notice the pile of stones by the second gate at the far end. Now it is covered in a delicate Cranesbill-type of flower, later a most spectacular SAXIFRAGE will emerge.

This is our heritage. Enjoy it, watch it year by year and don't harm it. It is a treasure.
