NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEME

A Public meeting was held on Tuesday 8th October 1985 in the Church Hall. The topic was the Haydon Bridge Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, which will include the following areas, Church Street, Northbank, Belmont, Belmont Gardens, and Alexandra Terrace.

The aims of Neighbourhood Watch can be summarised as follows:-

- + To reduce crime (especially house burglaries) and the fear of crime.
- + To develop a community spirit among people living in Neighbourhood Watch areas.
- + To encourage residents to help themselves by helping the Police in the prevention and detection of crime.

Earlier successful Neighbourhood Watch Schemes have lead to a reduction in local crime, the creation of a better community spirit and a quick and efficient circulation of crime prevention advice throughout the community.

Mrs Isabel Iceton chaired the meeting and introduced to the audience Supt. E. G. Smith (Commander, Hexham Sub Division), Sgt J. Grey (Crime Prevention Officer), P.C 2207 P. Clarke (Haydon Bridge Office). Also in attendance were members of the Special Constabulary.

Supt. Smith introduced the scheme, by pointing out that Neighbourhood Watch is not a new idea. The Saxons had local groups, keeping law and order, even peace. In 1829 Robert Peels Police Act was introduced, and a constable needed to be a good citizen and be prepared to protect the "Queen's Peace".

The present concept originated in Detroit, Michigan U.S.A. They became the local ears and eyes of the Police.

Supt Smith was careful to point out that the Scheme is not a vigilancy organisation. It is a defence against to-days thief who is more mobile. The Scheme is needed because the 'Old fashioned' village Bobby has gone. There are neither resources nor manpower available to re-introduce this type of village policing.

On Crime Prevention Sgt Grey pointed out that a Scheme such as this, whether it is initiated by the police or the local community need contact persons who are not policemen. They are part of a two-way process of information between the community and the police. They distribute booklets and window stickers, which are to be placed in a prominent position. On their own stickers deter burglars. Contact persons will also have meetings with a chair person to discuss problems.

The aims as Sgt Grey said are to reduce the opportunity for crime, reduce fear of crime, to develop Community Spirit, and to revamp the standing of the Police within the Community.

PC Clarke restate what Sgt Grey said "Those who commit crimes are determined rather than intelligent". Who ever you are, whether you are part of the scheme or not, the Police will investigate your crime call either from a 999 call or on Hexham 604111. Pc Clarke is available to speak to on H B 204.

As Editor of the Haydon News Mrs Howard has agreed to accept information from the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme for publication. At the end of the talk, the 48 people present voted to adopt the Scheme.

HAYDON BRIDGE SILVER BAND

Early in 1985 the Trustees of Haydon Bridge Silver Band decided that it would make sense to allow the very young members from the Hexham area to establish a band in Hexham. The Trustees had experienced considerable difficulty in appointing a suitable Band Master. Looking ahead the Silver Band Trustees had in mind the formation of Youth Bands, Brass and Military, covering the area served by Haydon Bridge High School. Discussions involving the Trustees, the High Schools Headmaster, Mr D Thompson, M A and Mr A Armstrong, Head of Music have resulted in formulating a scheme to encourage Music, Instrumental and Choral, throughout a wide area based on Haydon Bridge High School and on Haydon Bridge itself. This scheme follows the guide lines in the Silver Bands Constitution which has been agreed by the Charity Commissioners.

The Governors of the Shaftoe Foundation, having given careful consideration to proposals put forward by the Silver Band Trustees and the High School, have agreed to provide financial support. This support to be channelled through the Trustees of the Silver Band and to cover cost of ten hours instruction each week. Instrumental training to be given in the High School and Choral training in the Community Centre. It is hoped that the Choral Training will lead to re-forming the Haydon Bridge Choral Society.

The Silver Band Trustees apart from acting as agents, will provide instruments, music, hire charges and cost of travel with these points in mind the Trustees respectfully invite Patrons to continue financial assistance.

Other changes have also been made-but these are only in monthly time-table. This is to fit in more Evensongs so those who prefer the Book of Common Prayer will have at least one service from the Prayer Book each Sunday.

I do hope that we have managed to provide adequate facilities for everyone to worship with us who wishes to. Further details are on the church notice board or can be had from the vicar.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

24 OCTOBER 1985

As the title is meant to indicate, these notes do not pretend to be a full report of the Meeting. If you want to know the official record, you must go to the Minutes issued by the Parish Clerk. What Haydon News is trying to do is to draw attention to matters which will be of interest to residents in the hope that they will make their views known to their Parish Councillors and so help them make the decisions which agrees with the electors' wishes.

At the meeting : 6 Councillors, 3 Apologies, 3 members of the public.

Roadways

Nothing to report on the Back Lane. One of the District Councillors has a date to see the District Officer very soon.

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES of 1979/80 suggest that maybe the Grainger Trust (which sold some of the land for the factories) undertook to do some thing about the road serving Railway Cottages. (the report in last month's issue which said that English Industrial Estates had given US undertakings about the road should have said "had given NO undertakings"). The Parish Clerk is going to try to find out what was actually promised at the time.

Some Councillors expressed the fear that the high power delegation to the Ministry of Transport mounted by Haltwhistle would put Haydon Bridge's nose out of joint. The Chairman thought that the presence of Mr Rippon plus the extra cost of the Haltwhistle scheme, would preserve a balance.

Complaints were raised about running water on the North Bank footpath below the Crags-water now, but sheet ice later? - and about overgrown hedges near West End Garage and on the Fourstone Road. The weeds on the old bridge are now very dead, but are in need of a decent burial.

AMENITY

Renewed complaints about dogs doing what dogs do on the school playing fields, regardless of notices etc. This newspaper currently has a competition going to help keep the village free from litter (and we honestly think there has been some improvement). Would our dog-owning readers please remember that are more unpleasant things to step on than crisp packets?.

The Council ruefully paid a bill for about £27 for a litter-bin to be installed on the river bank. What distressed them was the fact that it was in position for all of 7 hours before some twit set light to it. The replacement will be in metal (Vandals- prepare your hacksaw) and will cost something up to £70.

The County Council asked for help in dealing with the expected consequences of the Statute which will deregulate the bus network next year. Instead of the Bus Company decideing which route should subsidise another, in future the local authority will have to decide which loss-making routes to pay for while the Bus Company looks after those which it thinks will be profitable. Parish Councils are asked to say whether they think that priority should be given to school traffic or to services for people at work, or to shopping trips, or to evenings out: and also to say which geographical parts of the present network are the most socially important. What a heaven-sent opportunity for people who live in the Parish to bend their Councillors ears. If you think it SAY IT.

The local Doctors are reported to be in favour of the building of a Health Centre, though nobody can foresee when the money will be available. At present the only prospective site is the open ground below the present Surgery, which not everybody sees as ideal. The problem is to find a big enough site somewhere more convenient.

THE LANGLEY MURDER

It was a beautiful evening as I came down from the hill above Langley and into the woods. There had been a light shower of rain and every blade of grass was jewelled with droplets that refracted colours from the evening sun. A slight breeze caused the tall pines to shake their shaggy heads, sending raindrops onto the woodland floor that smelt of glorious decay on that late evening in August.

The family were out walking again in the woods. I had seen them once before, but, how long they had lived at Langley I could not say- He was quite broad shouldered, with rather dark hair and a beautiful set of white teeth, he obviously took care of them- ate the right food etc, but on the other hand seemed rather moody, shy and wary of strangers. His wife was rather small and slim with light auburn hair and the couple had a family of two daughters and one son. The daughters could often be seen playing by the dam behind Jack Mounge saw mill, but the son- well, he was a different matter altogether, unlike the daughters who helped the mother at home with the food, he was a great fat lout of a creature who seem to agitate his father by standing around doing nothing most of the day- and always close to mother. At times when I passed where they lived the son would be fighting with father, and seemed to get more attention from his mother than his father did receive, which caused an atmosphere in the family- after all, the father should receive some attention from his wife.

One day as I walked by the lake I met the father coming back along the site of the old railway line on his own, and when I spoke to him he looked my way as if taken by surprise, then without letting on he altered his track and made off away from me, --- it was then I knew that he had been poaching, for he had in his possession a freshly killed pheasant. In the distance I saw Allen White mending a gap in the stone wall at the edge of the wood, and I had in mind to wander over and ask him about this family as to how long they had lived at Langley, for he would have possibly have seen them as he worked at the stone walling, - but before I got to him he reached into his pocket, withdrew his pipe, struck the match wandered homeward leaving behind a wisp of blue smoke.

My thoughts were "What would Philip the keeper say when he finds out about this lot and the pheasant poaching".

My interest in this family after the pheasant incident became so intense that all my walks were directed towards Langley. It was a Sunday afternoon as I stood by the lake watching a pair of Coot, when I got my eye on the whole family walking in the woods on the far side of the lake. The father's broad back just about hid the slim figure of his wife as she walked close to him with the two little girls dressed in red and white skipped and played as they followed along- but that great lout of a lad looked scruffy and sulky, walking yards behind, and seemed jealous of his father walking close to his mother. As the family moved up the hill and out of sight I got the feeling they had gone visiting a friend or some other relative and would be away for some time. They were either unsociable or just wanted to be left along. but always ready to go the other way when met by anyone.

I had been talking to Arther Dodd of Hill Top one day when he was busy in his garden getting his Leeks ready to win the Carts Bog Leek Show, when I asked him about the family he said that he had seen the little wife and girls once, but thought that they wouldn't be living at Langley for much longer.

Then It happened- one evening as I was watching a Heron feeding on the lake my eye caught sight of the father- he stood, head hung in a most menacing manner, the muscles in his broad back stood out, while his little wife fussed around him as if to calm him down for some reason. best known to themselves-I watched the agitated gaze in his eyes, and it was then that I saw the reason for his agitation- yards away stood that great useless lout of a lad, he had come back home to Langley, but no sign of the girls. He kept moving closer towards home with a most sulky look in his eyes,- then suddenly the father was at him, the howls were something shocking as the pair were locked in mortal combat, the mother trying her best to keep them peace,- I couldn't stand it,-I made for home.

The next day was Saturday and after breakfast I made for Langley for I was sure Allen White must of heard that most un-holy row, and by now it could be the talk of Langley, but as I approachrd I saw the father and his wife looking happy, standing in a close loving embrace as if nothing had happened the night before,-but no sign of that poor youth, where was he? had he left home and gone for good? I began towonder I hadn't walked far into the woods before I found the answer -there lying in the undergrowth was the body of the youth, quite dead with his throat torn out by sharp teeth. After I covered his body with branches I looked up towards the couple again and still saw that broad backed "DOG FOX" and his little "VIXEN" embracing. She was licking his ears and giving him all the attention. Soom now with all the family gone the DOG FOX and his VIXEN would leave their home at Langley and move closer towards the Allen Valley, for soon it would be Mating time and a new family would have to be attended to.
