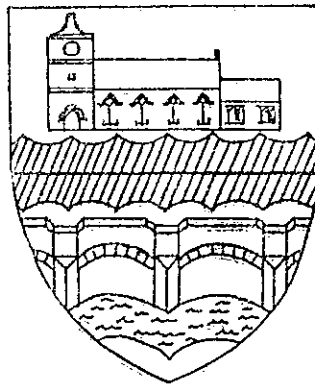

FRIENDS OF HAYDON BRIDGE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Friends' AGM was held on 24 November. The following are extracts from the Annual Statement made by the retiring Chairman, Mr J P Richardson.

"The anti-litter poster competition which we organised last October was very well supported, particularly by the First School. It would be too pessimistic to assume that it has made no lasting impression at all on the participants.

Money had to be raised to replace the cost of repairing the duplicator, and for this purpose we ran our Jam and Jumble Sale in September. The response of the Village to our call for things to sell was quite overwhelming, and I cannot say too much in appreciation of that support and encouragement for what we do.

The cost of materials for a four-pge issue of the News is about £30. Usually we manage five or six pages, making our annual cost for ten issues somewhere between £350 and £400. If we are to find this money on a regular basis we do badly need a bigger response from individuals in the Parish who are prepared to make a small payment for their copy of the News.

In the summer we had the opportunity of buying a real printing machine for £250. We are extremely gratified that both the Shaftoe Educational Foundation and the Parish Council think well enough of our efforts to subscribe the whole of this sum between them."

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS (Meeting of 27 November)

Eight Councillors present

Next year's Parish Rate has been set at 2½p as against 2p this year. 2p would have been not quite enough. The new Cemetery shed and provision for the cost of the 1987 elections make quite a large call on available funds, but of course should not arise again for some time.

A member of the public voiced concern about reports that insurance companies were to impose higher premiums or even possibly refuse some cover on Council housing. Cllr Mrs Howard will raise this question at the District Housing Committee. That Committee has now had the problem of the Back Lanes dropped in its lap, and the Chairman of it has been out to inspect in person. Whether money can be found to deal with the matter through the Housing Committee remains to be seen. The Meeting is in January.

Meanwhile, if you are driving along the Back Lane, remember that it is not a public highway and your motor insurance may not cover you.

It now seems to be settled that the new card-phone box will be set up between the windows of the Co-op.

An approach to British Rail to provide some money for improving the appearance of the station surroundings with a few plants failed because all this year's allocation has been spent. The PC will try again next year. Twelve hanging baskets have been ordered from Tynedale District Council at £11 each already planted up. If you have any ideas for places to hang them get in touch with a Councillor - or write to Haydon News.

"NATURAL" FUND RAISER.

I have just had the pleasure of watching a film by Mr. Bill Tait entitled "An Eye For Nature". The well attended audience at the Torch Centre drew many handicapped people from the Tynedale area with a bus coming from Matfen Hall and walking patients from Hexham General Hospital.

Bill's patience (and he certainly has some) was justly rewarded with some excellent photography that was backed up with recordings of bird call's - music - and the gentle rippling of the River Allen. Kestral's, sparrow hawks, dippers and waders all came under the watching eye of the camera, from nestling time to the flight of the fledgling's.

The tawny owls and the barn owls were very pleasing to watch, and one could hardly imagine how those part bald, part fluff chicks could turn out to be the majestic birds of adulthood.

Bill also (with that aforementioned patience) coaxed out the nocturnal badger to feed on nuts etc., and allowing him to get some very fine close up's of this attractive animal. I have been a countryman all my life, but I must confess I was unaware of the multi colours of a frogs eye, from dark blue, pale blue, orange and black.

The people who have seen this film, will, hopefully bear me out in what I have tried to depict, for those who hav'nt, a date in their diary for a future showing could prove to be a very enjoyable evening.
