PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS. (Dec 85/ Jan 86)

The back lane to Radcliffe Road had another airing. Those who own land forming part of the "Haydonian Lakeland" (as it was described last week) will soon receive letters from Tynedale asking if they wish to contribute to improvements of the surface. If they say no, there is very little that the Highways Committee can do, but the District Councillors on the Parish Council promised to go on trying to find some other way in which an improvement can be brought about.

The "By-Pass Sub-Committee" has arranged a meeting with Mr. Rippon M.P. on Saturday 1st February. One of the main topics of conversation will be to try to find out what "the consultants" were asked to report about and what they have said about it - if indeed they have said anything at all. Meanwhile Tynedale has published its Local Plan for the Tyne Valley, which is full of promises to press for the by-pass to be built, and to protect its proposed line from encroachment by other projects. There is a reason for this - areas each side of the A69 at the Western end of the village are scheduled for new housing development, but cannot be given access to the road so long as it continues to be the main trunk route.

Lots of places are suffering from water either running away or failing to run away - both conditions producing the risk of broken bones when the ice forms. Tynedale Council are looking at Alexandra Terrace and the North Bank, but it seems there are bad spots on the south side of the river as well about which it may not be possible to do a great deal. The County Council replied to the suggestion that the Church Street railings should be extended further north in front of the Railway Hotel, by saying that people would still be entitled to stop there to set down passengers, so more railings would make no improvement. (The fact that it might be difficult or impossible to open the passenger door would not, apparently, persuade people to stop further on). The Parish Council was not convinced.

It was reported that the village phone boxes are to be renewed within the next few months. The new ones will automatically ring the exchange when they are too full of coins, so that someone can come and empty them. Some councillors thought that the phone - tappers would probably get there first.

Finally, the Chairman raised the idea of creating a separate ward of the Parish for Langley, which would then elect its own specific member of the Parish Council. Two thoughts lie behind this suggestion: first that the needs of the Langley area of the Parish may be unconsciously overlooked by the Council if there is no member directly concerned with them; second, it means that in the event of a bye-election, whether in the Langley ward or in the main Parish, it would only be necessary to open the Polling Station in the appropriate place, thus saving half the expense running the election. Perhaps residents of Langley will make their views on this known to the Councillors.

SHAFTOE ALMSHOUSE CHARITY.

The Charity Commission has issued a Draft of a new Scheme to regulate the administration of the Shaftoe Almshouses. At present they are governed by an Act of Parliament passed in 1785. The Draft is available for public inspection at the Shaftoe Library.

On Saturday 14th December about 30 young people met at the United Reform Church Hall to inaugurate a club for people aged 13 years and over.

The idea began when the United Reform Church consulted with the Methodist Church concerning the use of their hall which was hardly ever put to use. The Methodists did not need it to extend their present work, but Mr. Ernie Swinburne and some of the other Methodist leaders felt that there was a need for a meeting place for older young people.

The scheme developed from there, and the Roman Catholics and the Church of England were invited to become involved in thinking and planning. A Steering committee was formed and on 14th December a meeting of young people was called to test the response. The young people proved to be so enthusiastic that a sponsored walk was held on 5th January to raise some funds and the club is now underway. It is meeting every Saturday evening in the United Reform Church Hall. There will always be adult's in attendance, but the club is intended to be the young people's own venture. Our hope is that they will work for it and organise it themselves.

The club is open to all young people 13 years and over. Parents and other adults will be most welcome to help supervise the club. If you are prepared to help from time to time on a Saturday evening, please come along or contact Mr. Swinburne. Many thanks to the people who have already helped by donating money and articles for the use of the club, also to the many people who sponsored young people on the recent sponsored walk.

ABOUT THE HAYDON NEWS.

You will know that the Haydon News is produced by the Friends of Haydon Bridge. The "Friends" were formed to carry out the following objectives:

- A) to support the work of the Parish and District Councils in the interests of the community and its individual members.
- B) to show an interest in Council meetings and activities and to ensure that this work is more widely known and appreciated.
- C) to debate and if necessary take action arising from Parish and District Council meetings.
- D) to strengthen the sense of community within the Parish: to locate the skills and expertise available in it and use them for the benefit of all.
- E) to publish a regular News Sheet which would include matters of interest to the Parish.
- F) to raise adequate funds for the achievement of the foregoing objects.

The "Friends" is run by an annually elected committee of ten. At present they are:

- Chairman : Mr. J. P. Richardson.
- Vice-Chairman : Mrs F Bell. Mrs A Carey.
- Secretary : Mrs I Johnson.
- Treasurer : Mr L Carey.
- Other Members : Miss A Carter. Mrs J Hawley. Mrs M Howard. Mr R McVay. Mr P Sharp. Mrs G Richardson.

We aim to produce 10 issues of the Haydon News each year. On average each issue contains 5 sheets of paper. This means that (allowing for two pages of advertisements) the editor, Mrs Howard, has to find eighty pages of text each year. The stencils are then typed. Each issue comprises approximately 750 copies, and Mrs Hawley therefore duplicates 7500 pages per copy - 75,000 per year - and collates and staples them. The 750 copies of each issue are then distributed to approximately 17 volunteers, who deliver - we hope - to every house in the Parish - from Sewingshields to East Mill Hills to Milston Rig. It is, as you will realise, quite a lot of work for quite a lot of people. No charge is made for the News, but we still have to buy paper, ink, stencils and staples. Luckily we are loyally supported by the people who advertise on the front and back pages, and the thanks which appear every month at the head of the advertisement page are sincerely meant: without the advertisement revenue it is hard to believe that we could keep going. We think that by producing the News we are doing something useful: Help, advice, ideas and contributions (financial or literary) from our readers are always welcomed.
