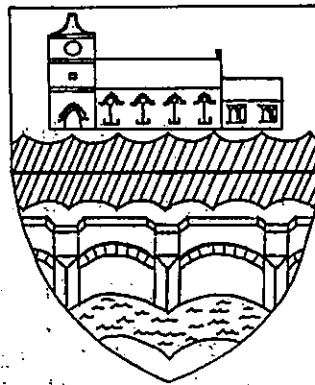

Dear Friends,

I have included in the Haydon News a letter which is not signed or addressed.

Many of the thoughts of this person are echoed by others in this village.

The idea of involving the Youth organisations in Community Beautification of this village is not new. Less than 3 weeks ago my own Girl Guided did a survey of the village and picked out areas that they willing to tidy and plant with Spring and Summer flowers.

Likewise the Friends of Haydon Bridge and the Parish Council have shown great interest in this topic on more than one occasion. As a result consultations between the Parish Council and the High School have begun, and many new and helpful ideas has emerged which will in the future be put into practice.

In the end we all need help from interested people who live in the village. Mrs L. Phelps and other members of the Parish Council are willing to listen to your ideas and offers of practical help.

FROM TYNEDALE.

One of the most unsightly and unhygienic aspects of the hot weather we have recently enjoyed, is the low water level in the river. This together with raw sewage being put into the river constitutes a health hazard.

The Enviroment Services Health Officer has agreed to discuss this matter with the Water Authority to see if a solution can be found.

Arising out of the low river water situation, is a small stagnant pond area to the East of the picnic sight. Once again this matter will be taken up with the Water Authority in the hope that a solution can be found.

The replacement of metal windows within the village are part of a 5 year programme, with the older properties in Hordley Acres being budgeted for this financial year 1986/87. Other properties with similar windows in Strother Close will not be replaced until at least 1991/92. This is a 5 year programme and therefore even with a 1/2 million capital input each year over this period, the schedule could alter as assessment of need is made each year.

I hope to include more information on matters arising at Tynedale District Council in the next issue. So please let me have all your literary masterpieces by Friday 22nd August at the latest.

THE HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE COMMITTEE.

The above committee would like to clarify an item in the balance sheet, year ending 31st March 1986, which appeared in the Haydon News April issue.

The contingency fund, which stands at £1,773 . 05 is in fact, the sum raised by the Watson Family & Friend's for the year 1985. This was the proceeds from dances, raffles etc, which they ran, and was not shown on the receipts side of balance sheet 1985/86.

As the balance sheet showed, we were able to balance the account's without using the Watson's money, so it was transferred to a contingency fund, and was included in Note I on the balance sheet.

There is also a sum of £749 . 17 shown as a balance at 31/3/86. This sum is the balance of £1,416 . 23 which the Watson's raised in the year 1984. This sum was put into the general account and was shown on the receipt side on balance sheet 31/5/85. The total balance was therefore £2522 . 22 on 14/4/86.

Questions have been asked about this matter and we hope this will answer all.

All of the courses that operate in the Lower Sixth are subject to certain conditions, available for adults to join. We can offer two year 'A' level courses in Physics, Biology, Chemistry, English, French, Geography, History, Mathematics, Religious Studies, Design and Engineering Drawing or one year 'O' level courses in English Language, Mathematics, Human Biology, Geology and Sociology, as well as R.S.A. Typing. Non examination courses are available in the Art Department. Fees are set at the discretion of the Committee but will normally be equivalent to the Adult Association Fees i.e. £12 per term per course.

### FLEXI - STUDY

From September 1986 Maydon Bridge will be offering students the opportunity to study two subjects by 'distance learning'. The two areas are English Language and Geography 'O' level. ### HIRING OF PREMISES AND AFFILIATION FEES

Members of Clubs and Societies are able to hire accommodation at the school and Sports Hall for their own use. The fees for this are available from the School office. It is however usually advantageous for these groups to affiliate to the Adult Association in order to reduce the cost for their members. Any group or individual who wishes to use the facilities are advised to contact the Deputy Head (Community) in order to negotiate a suitable rate.

### ACTIVITIES FOR YOUNGER MEMBERS

Two sessions are available in the Sports Hall for those under thirteen years of age to join in a variety of sporting activities. The cost is 25p per child, and the sessions are held in the Sports Hall on a Monday 5-6.30 and on Wednesday 5-6p.m.

### YOUTH ACTIVITIES CLASSES

A variety of classes are offered to young people in the area, although those over eighteen are able to attend as well. The cost to register for these classes is \$5 (under eighteen) \$6.50 (over eighteen) and entitles the students to attend all of the classes offered.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS.

Eight Councillors were present, one apology, two absentees.

The County Council has again refused to consider a skip site in the village, on the grounds the the Frakham tip is within 5 miles. But, asked the Parish Council, where is NCC measuring from? - in a straight line or by the road which users would have to take ? The Clerk will pursue this question.

The delay in getting the Wentworth recreation centre finished means that Haydon Bridge School of Sport will actually take place in Haydon bridge again this year. Tynedale Council has been warned that the support of the Shaftoe Foundation will not be forthcoming for an event in Maxham, so it will be interesting to see what happens next year.

No progress in cutting the grass on the road verges at the west end of the village. The highway authority will only cut at lay-overs and junctions on trunk roads. However, the Parish Council thinks that there is a question of safety involved, and the matter will be raised again.

Planning applications included illuminated signs for Langley Castle, a proposed new house in the Station Yard, and the opening of a cafe area in J.Clark's newsagents.

The Scouts and Cubs are struggling to raise funds to buy a new mini - bus, but reported themselves to be still £750 short at the date of the meeting. They found a sympathetic Parish Council, and were promised half of what they needed as a grant, in the hope that Tynedale would stump up the balance.

Nobody much wants to take on the problem of improving the river bank downstream of the Anchor. It seems that it is just outside the powers of all the parties which might be thought to be responsible. Perhaps if it could be proved that the sewerage works on the other side had interfered with the natural flow of the water and thus caused erosion on the other bank.....? Anyway, some solution will have to be found if Haydon Bridge is to enter the Best Kept Village Competition next year, as Councillor Waite suggested.
