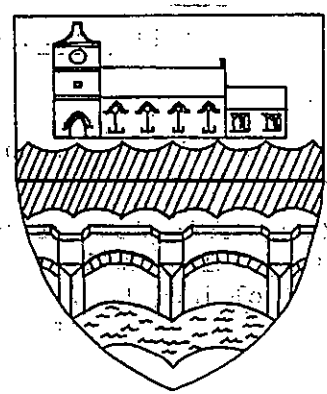

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS. - APRIL 1986.

Seven councillors present.

Not a lot of meat on the bones this month, but one or two matters which may be of interest.

The ants seem to have invaded Greenwich Garden's, and the efforts of the Environmental Health people don't seem very effective to eradicate them. One resident claimed they had moved into the house with her from her previous home. Representations will be made to the District Council.

The appearance of the south bank of the river between the two bridges offends many eyes. The reasons for allowing tipping there are understood, but it is hoped that the Water Authority can be persuaded that the bank ought to be permanently improved.

The Planning Officer has informed the Council that the use made of the north bank by Bowman's Chemists is not a breach of planning restrictions. Nevertheless he will see what can be achieved by seeking co-operation in limiting annoyance to residents.

English Industrial Estates, which owns the railway yard, says it can do little to prevent overnight parking by heavy lorries, though it has asked the Police to warn off any that are found there. Without much optimism that it would make any real difference, the Council decided to put up a notice prohibiting overnight parking.

It is hoped that a Youth Training Scheme job can be arranged to repair the picnic tables at minimal expense.

Finally, it was reported that repairs of the road around the manhole cover in Ratcliffe Road, means that there are now two bumps instead of one, and the traffic is twice as noisy.

SHAFTOE EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION.

The Governors have authorised the issue of the following notice:

The Shaftoe Educational Foundation is empowered to make Grants for promoting the education and training of persons resident, or who have a parent or parent's resident in the Parish of Haydon.

Grants can be made in respect of any level of course: and in respect of vocational training as well as academic education. The cost of books, stationery, equipment and travelling can all qualify for Grants. There is no test of means, but the Governors will give preference to those applicants whose financial circumstances are more constrained.

Applications for grants in respect of courses commencing in Autumn of any year should be lodged with the Clerk by the preceding 30th June for consideration at a meeting of Governors held in July. Other applications will be considered in March and November of each year.

Further information can be obtained by writing to the Clerk to the Governors at Shaftoe Terrace, Haydon Bridge.

Copies of the Schemes under which the Educational Foundation and to the Almshouse Charity are administered can be inspected at the Shaftoe Centre Library, Church Street, Haydon Bridge.

CHANGING LIVES.

Changing individual lives for the better is what most people hope to do when they give or raise money in Christian Aid Week.

They are putting food in hungry mouths, supplying medicine to fight disease, and education to get rid of ignorance. The need for all this is undiminished. And will continue to be for as long as the basic causes of poverty remain unchanged.

Most people readily appreciate that if their money is going to have any lasting effect it must be spent mainly on long-term development rather than short term aid. It's the difference, for example, between sending a shipment of food to the starving and working with those same people on agricultural projects so that food can be produced on the spot. Better still are projects which recognise the inter-relations between hunger, illness and ignorance and try to take an integrated approach which tackles them all at the same time.

Christian Aid Week collectors and supporters understand this well. But where some begin to worry is when Christian Aid suggests there is even more to it than that, involving changes and actions of a political kind.

It may help if we remind ourselves that there are vast numbers of hungry people in the world who don't grow their own food, not because they don't know how to (that is an insult to them) but because they have been forced off their land, or because more powerful or greedy people have taken it away, or because competition or misfortunes beyond their control have forced them to sell it off to pay their debts.

How is their land to be re-possessed?

Or again when we talk about changing people's lives for the better it is all too easy to assume we know what is good for them whereas they have as much right as we do to decide for themselves. The trouble is they are not always free to do so. Their rulers don't give them a voice or the means to take common action towards reaching their goals.

How are their rights to be restored.

It is difficult to think of answers to this sort of question which don't involve us in 'politics'. That can create problems for so-called charities which have to work within certain constraints, and for Christians who feel nervous about the relations between politics and faith. That relation is certainly not a simple one, but can be seriously committed to changing things for good and deny it altogether.

Without turning Jesus into a party politician of modern times, the gospels suggest that his attempt to change things for good not only led to finding the next meal for hungry people but to suggesting some very drastic alterations in the relations between high and low, rich and poor, weak and powerful in Palestine. Tackling bad laws and oppressive systems may be as Godlike and Christlike a thing to do as buying bread for the multitude.

As we give and raise the funds so sorely needed to remedy the worst effects of poverty we should also think deeply about the relations between rich and poor, for it is there that deprivation is caused and is perpetuated; it is there that change is most needed.

REPORT ON THE A.G.M. of HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY ASSOC.

On Tuesday 22nd April 1986, Mr. Rowarth took the chair at the A.G.M. The following officers were elected for the forthcoming year:

PRESIDENT: Mr. E. Waite.
CHAIRMAN: Mr. Rowarth.
VICE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Richardson.
LETTING SEC. Mr. Coombes.
TREASURER: Mr. Johnson.
AUDITOR: Mr. Best.

Due to the resignation of Mrs. Hudspith as minutes secretary a vacancy has arisen for this position. There were no volunteers in the meeting, but it is hoped that someone in the community will give their services to help the community centre. The work is interesting and there isn't too much of it. The ability to take shorthand or to type is not a requirement.

After Mr. Johnson had given the financial statement for the year 1985/6 Mr. Rowarth reported that estimations for next years income and expenditure show an approximate shortfall of £500. The association therefore needs the help of the people of Haydon Bridge in order to survive. You can help in 3 ways. Firstly, you and your family could become members of the community association at the modest cost of £2 per family or £1 for individuals, secondly, donations are always welcome, and thirdly use the community centre. There are long periods during the week when the community centre is not in use. The cost of hiring the hall in 1986 is very reasonable. The cost is £2.75 for the first 2 hours, then £1.65 for subsequent hours. Hire of the hall for dances is £25 and for coffee mornings the charge is only £2.

It was decided at the meeting to redecorate the front door, entrance hall and sign, and that Community Rural Aid should be approached to help with the project. It was also agreed that a quinquennial review of the building should be undertaken in order that the Community Association could anticipate any problems and thus be able to budget for them. It was also agreed that the caretakers wage should be increased by 10%.

The Community Association needs your help. If you feel you could serve Haydon bridge either as minutes secretary or by subscribing or donating to the hall funds or by using the hall yourself or encouraging your friends to do so, please contact Mr. C. Coombes on Haydon bridge 416 who will be only too pleased to receive your call.
