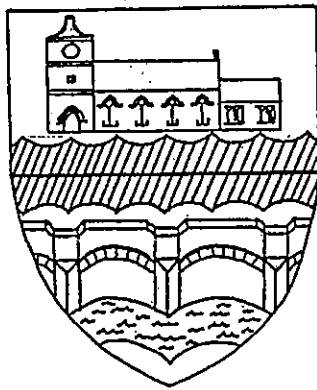

NOTICE FROM TYNEDALE.

INSTALLATION OF CENTRAL HEATING.

There has been full coverage in the press with reference to Central Heating installation throughout Tynedale, for those properties not yet brought up to the Parker Morris Standard.

Concern has been shown by some councillors about a blanket increase rent for all Council House Tenants. The policy of Tynedale is to operate a "Pool" System of bringing in extra money to cover the cost of large projects not included in the present Capital Action Allocation of money for 1986/1987.

By the time this is published I will have co-operated with other members of the council, to have this issue returned to the Housing Committee for further discussion.

In the meantime anyone with partial or no central heating, who have not been approached by the Council Housing Dept., and who feel they should be considered; Please contact Mr. I.W. Darling, Housing Officer and he will consider your claim.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKING.

MEETING HELD 25.9.86.

Only one councillor missing.

A member of the public voiced dissatisfaction at the £2 rent increase to be imposed on all council tenants to pay for central heating. Apparently those houses with partial central heating will be looked at to see if they measure up to some minimum standard - if not, presumably they will be improved; if they do - hard luck. The advice from Councillor's is that if you think the increase is unfair in your case, you should tell the District Council. Those people who are having their metal window frames replaced will feel the draught: the work is being done during November to January.

As expected the back lane residents have not volunteered to pay to have the road surfaced, so the question has now been abandoned by the highway people and passed over to the Housing Committee to be dealt with on amenity grounds. There is hope that this new approach will bear fruit.

A somewhat sterile correspondence is still being exchanged with the Department of Transport about the by-pass. The Council felt it was time to demand a straight answer to the question "what did the consultant's report say?" (But will they get me?)

Tynedale District Council is providing £1700 to pay for propane gas heaters in the squash courts. Some councillors are worried that use of the Sports Centre will fall away if the membership charges are kept higher than those of Wentworth.

Plans for improving the appearance of the village were mentioned. The Parish is to pay to have the verge cut at the west end of the village, and some bulbs for planting that have been volunteered. The High School also has plans for planting and tending. By contrast, the shrubs in Langley Garden's are proving to be too healthy, and are obstructing the footpath: representation will be made.

INFOBUS is coming. This is a mobile advice bureau on social security etc., and will visit once a fortnight on Wednesday afternoons. More details in the next issue.

A new telephone kiosk is also coming. Councillor Mr. Drydon has been delegated to discuss with British Telecom whether a better site can be found.

The Scouts are to receive a loan of the balance needed to enable them to replace their mini-bus when the old one finally expires. A grant has been applied for from Tynedale District Council which, it is hoped, will enable them to repay the Parish.

The sale raised about £180, so it was very worthwhile from our point of view, and we think most of our customers got some good bargains.

By a lucky chance, the Multiple Sclerosis appeal had their jumble sale in Corbridge on the following Wednesday, and I am sure all contributors will be glad to know that we were able to pass on the un-sold goods to support this Charity, rather than send them for scrap.

In November we shall be holding the Annual General Meeting at which a new Committee is elected. Many of the present members have been in office since the Association was formed, and feel that there is a real need for some new faces and ideas. We think the Friends does a valuable job in the village, and would like to think that some more people would be happy to give a few hours a month to ensure that it continues to do that job. On the Saturday evening prior to the event, Haydon Bridge Chess Club officials and members welcomed David Norwood and his parents in the Haydon Hotel. The atmosphere was very informal, and the highlight of the evening was a small surprise birthday celebration cake, which had been made by Mrs.A.Fulton, and was presented to David for his 18th birthday which he had attained just the day before.

At 10.00 a.m. the following morning we began to organize the equipment for usage during the afternoon's events at the Langley Castle Hotel. Firstly, 31 tables had to be transported from St.Cuthberts Church Hall to the Castle, and we are very thankful to Roger Bookes, for giving permission and also to David Tulip and friends who provided the transport. Also arranging all the tables and numbering them, 39 set and boards had to be set up. By 12.30 p.m. just half an hour before the performance was due to begin, we were ready to greet the players as they arrived.

The event began at 1.15 p.m. and in all 35 opponents out of a possible 38 had turned up. During the performance Radio Newcastle's Andy Irvine arrived and conducted interviews with Mr.Norwood and some of the players. Also reporters and photographers from the Newcastle Journal and Hexham Courant came onto the scene.

After 5½ hours play David Norwood had won 28 games and drawn 7. Bearing in mind that there were two very strong players graded 175 and 180 respectively, David gave a creditable performance in not losing a game. (Davids official grading is 220.)

Of special note, Mrs.Daphne Runell from the NTLSR CLUB obtained a draw (the only female in the competition,) as did our Club Chairman David Tulip. The best adult game prize was won by Jonathan Nicholas from Tynedale Chess Club, and the best junior game prize was won by 8 year old Marc Blenleiron of Durham.

Captain of the Haydon Bridge Chess Team - Roger Bookes gave a vote of thanks to David Norwood, sponsors - Robinson & Cowell, Clubs and players supporting the event, and to Langley Castle for providing the facilities. Additional thanks was given to the Secretary of Haydon Bridge for organising the event.

David Norwood replied that he had enjoyed very much his stay, and the hospitality he had received from the people of Haydon Bridge and that the event was the best he had ever attended. He wished Haydon Bridge Chess Club every success.

It is hoped that this occasion will stimulate old, young, male and female, experienced or beginner to play chess and perhaps pay a visit to the village club which meets every Wednesday evening from 8p.m. at the Haydon Hotel, Shaftoe Street. You will be very welcome.

CRODEN - STANDEGE

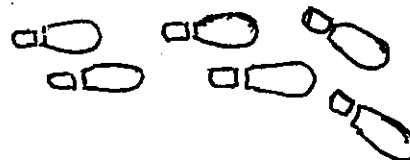
Left Crowden Y.H. 9.00 tagged onto several other walkers.
