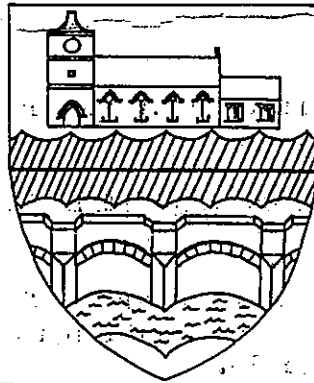

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS. Meeting 22nd. January 1987.

9 Councillors present.

The council took note of the preliminary report of the consultants hired to pronounce on the need for a bypass. Quite clearly they were only concerned to consider the potential benefit to road-users: resident's amenity does not enter the equation. So it looks as if the only thing which can be done is to keep on arguing whenever the opportunity presents itself.

At the Council's request, a Police Sergeant from Hexham came to tell us about the policing arrangements in the village. The fact that there is no resident PC does not he said in anyway affect the level of on-duty police presence in the village. Constables based in such places as Acomb and Whitfield patrol the area as part of their beat, just as a policeman resident here would be expected to cover the same area as part of his. Radio response back-up is available from the Traffic Officers, who are never more than a few minutes away in their cars. Just the same, the feeling is the the Council would be happier if there was a local Bobby.

Not much else. One or two planning applications which excited no comment.

A suggestion to "twin" the village with Vailly Sur Aisne where some of the high School pupils have been on exchange visits: does "twining" have any avio supporters? Write and tell us.

AIDS ADVICE.

TO PATIENTS OF DRs HIGH & GRAMAM.

Every household in the village will, by now, have received a pamphlet telling them about AIDS - a new virus infection which will have some impact on all of us in the future. You will hear more about it from the media, you will hear more about it from people who have been infected by the virus and we will all, in varying degrees, wonder, WHAT DOES IT HAVE TO DO WITH ME AND MY FAMILY?

I would like to tell you what I think the situation is and what we should do about it. The statements I shall make and the advice I will be giving is based on what I understand about AIDS at this moment in time but, as we are confronted with a disease that has only just appeared, we do not, as yet, know all the answers to all the questions that can arise but I would like to "put you in the picture", as I see it, at the moment.

First let me say that the emergence of "NEW" viral illnesses is no new thing: Viruses are small particles of living material that can ENTER the bodies of other living organism and affect the "HOST" in some way. Sometimes the effect on the "HOST" may be trivial, as with the virus that causes WARTS, VERUOAS or "COLD SORES", and some have caused illnesses of trivial inconvenience like CHICKEN POX, GERMAN MEASLES, ORDINARY MEASLES ETC. Other virus infections, like "flu", have knocked us out for a few days, sometimes more, after which we have recovered completely and thought no more about them.

But some virus infections appear "out of the blue" and may cause devastating effects on some people and then, apparently, disappear again and are heard of no more. This was the case with ENCEPHALITIS LETARGICA which came with 'flu' epidemics in 1917, and subsequent 'flu epidemics until about 1930, which caused some of the affected patients to develop what is known as PARKINSON'S DISEASE. (Virus infection is not the only cause of PARKINSON'S DISEASE, but some cases WERE caused by virus infections.)

Another virus infection that appeared "out of the blue" was MYXOMATOSIS that erupted in the 1950's onto rabbits with devastating effects on the total rabbit population but from which they, the rabbits, have survived and show every sign of surmounting.

every year or so, new types of flu virus emerge and are identified, giving rise to outbreaks of short illness, from which most people emerge with no apparent harm and, probably, increased immunity.

So, new virus infections are no new phenomena and a study of nature and disease indicates that LIFE goes on:::

So what of AIDS?

AIDS was first recognised, around 1980, as being caused by a virus that could enter the human body and which may, after an interval of time, reduce the bodies ability to fight off infections by bacteria ("germs") and, when it was first recognised it seemed to be occurring in MEN who were HOMOSEXUAL.

Soon it was realised that the virus that caused AIDS could be passed to WOMEN WHO had sexual intercourse with men who had the AIDS virus but ALSO that the AIDS virus (HIV) could be passed by BLOOD to BLOOD contact from one MAN (or WOMAN'S) BLOOD to another man or woman who had close contact with infected BLOOD. So, another group of "AT RISK" cases became apparent, ie DRUG USERS who were injecting themselves and others with a syringe or needle that had previously been used by an AIDS VIRUS carrier, or by sexual partners or such people...

So, two groups of "AT RISK" to the AIDS virus include:-

1) Persons who are HOMOSEXUAL MALES or who may have had intercourse with a partner who has had male homosexual intercourse.

THIS IS NOT TO SAY THAT ALL HOMOSEXUALS HAVE AIDS - out this is one "AT RISK" group.

and 2) ANY PERSON who has had DRUGS injected by a NEEDLE that may have been used by someone else MAY be "AT RISK". As may be a sexual partner of such a person. There is NO RISK from any injection given by a doctor or nurse as all the needles they use are new and sterile for each patient. It is drug users who inject themselves and others with needles and equipment that is not new and sterile each time that are "AT RISK".

If anyone feels they could be AT RISK as a result of a sexual experience they have had in the past OR FOR ANY OTHER REASON I would suggest they make an appointment to see Dr.Graham or myself for advice.

We are here to give you assurance.
