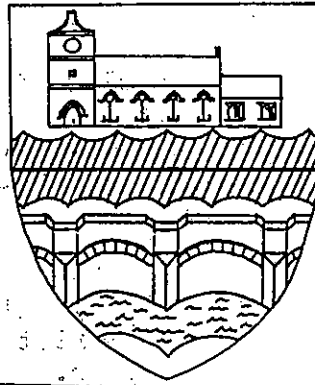

Because of problems with the printing of Haydon News, the Meetings for both February and March.

The main interest of the February meeting was David's proposals for a Health Centre. These have been fully reported in the Council.

The Telephone Box The various interested parties have failed to agree on the idea of moving the phone box to the present site of the Co-op, and nobody can think of anywhere else in the village where it will be satisfactory with it. So the Council is going to tell British Telecom that they had better put the new one where the old one is - and signpost it a bit better!

Infobus The organisers don't think you are making enough use of the services provided, and may leave Haydon Bridge on their itinerary in the future. If you would like to make use of this service, but can't because of the day or time when it is available and not convenient, or for some other reason, let your Parish Councillor know. If Infobus is withdrawn, you will not be lost. The NHS is experimenting with its own mobile information service which is planning to spend half a day somewhere in Langley Downland. Watch Mrs Porteous' window for details.

The By-pass Those whose interests are in favour of delay and obstruction continue to obstruct progress. In the absence of any move forward, the Council decided to press strongly, through Councillor In Edson, for a positive action to approve the Watson's Garage extension. At the moment each project seems to be waiting for the other.

The High School Several schemes are in preparation for using the High School facilities for the benefit of the wider community. Did you know, for instance, that you can be allowed to attend GCSE classes in the School along with the ordinary pupils? We hope to publish information on these facilities, as they become available, in Haydon News.

Snag at the Quarry We have a nice new hut, but unfortunately it had been put up not quite where the Planning Committee said it could be. This raises a variety of problems, which Chris Mrs Howard has the delicate task of trying to resolve.

Scout Minders Fund-raising has been pretty successful, but the final figure has not yet been achieved. The Council decided to give some further help by dipping in the balance of the grant which had been set aside for this purpose in the year's budget.

Seats Chris Mrs Gannon is doing a survey of the condition and siting of all the 30-odd public seats in the village. Comments or suggestions should be sent to her please.

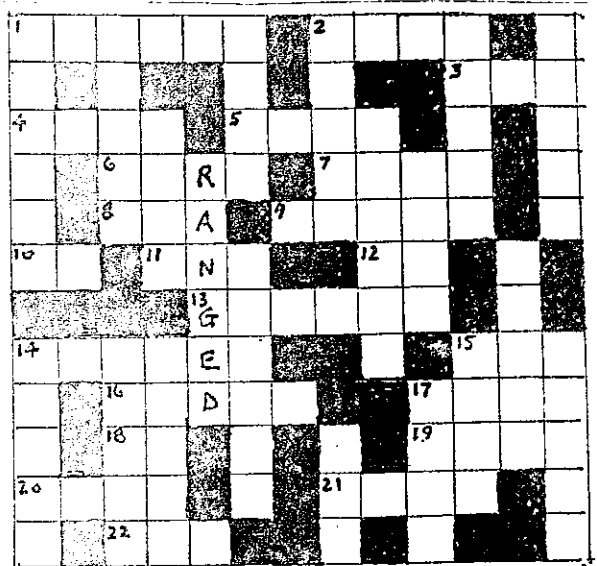

That helps everyone - and people helping each other to cut crime is what Neighbourhood or Home Watch Schemes are all about. Everybody keeps an eye out for anything suspicious in the neighbourhood. And they are better informed about what to do if they see anything suspicious.

There's no great mystery about why the scheme has been successful.

Thieves will go elsewhere if they know you and your neighbours are looking out for them.

If you would like to form or join a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, your local police are the people to talk to. They'll explain the details and arrange for a Crime Prevention Officer to advise you.



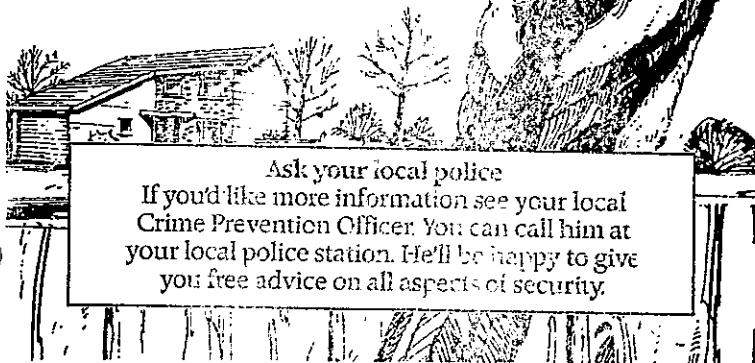

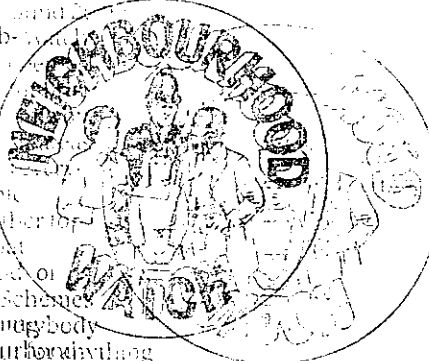
