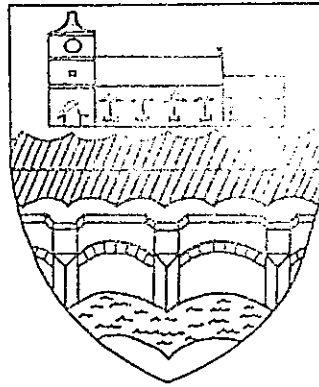

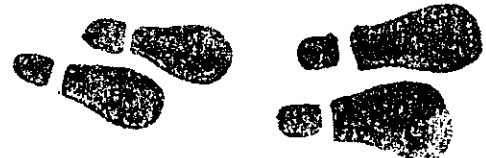
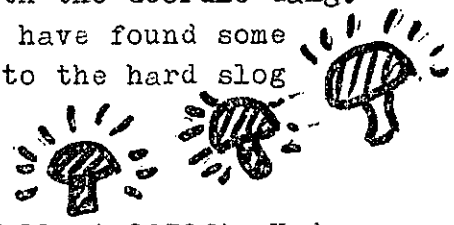
TUESDAY 3rd June: DUFTON TO ALSTON

To whom it may concern,

Towards the end of 1985 the Trustees of the Haydon Bridge Silver Band issued a statement of Policy from which I am pleased to quote.

" Looking ahead the Trustees had in mind the formation of Youth Bands, both Brass and Military, covering the area served by Haydon Bridge High School. Discussions involving the Trustees, the High School's Headmaster, Mr. d. Thompson, MA, and Mr A Armstrong, Head of Music have resulted in formulating a scheme to encourage music instrumental and choral, throughout a wide area. This to be based on Haydon Bridge High School and the Haydon Bridge Community Association.

The Governors of the Shaftoe Educational Foundation, having given careful consideration to a scheme put forward by the Silver Band Trustees, have agreed to award financial support. This support to be channelled through the Trustees to cover the cost of instruction. Instrumental and Choral training to be given in the High School and in the Community centre. The Silver Band Trustees Engaged Mr Alan Armstrong as Musical Director.

The Silver Band Trustees, Apart from acting as agents, will provide instruments, music, hire charges and the cost of travel. With these points in mind the Trustees respectfully invite Patrons to continue financial assistance.

A sincere Thank You for valuable support already given. Further details will be provided as the scheme gets under way."

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

At the April meeting - which was the farewell appearance of the Council elected in 1983 - County Cllr D Gibson was also present.

Before the meeting closed, Cllr Bates, the Chairman, thanked the retiring members for their services and paid special tribute to Cllr E Waite OBE for his long and active devotion to the welfare of the Parish as Headmaster, District Councillor and Parish Councillor, and in many other capacities.

The new Council met on 28 May. Only one member was missing: she had celebrated her re-election with a new baby! Cllr Bates was re-elected Chairman and Cllr Drydon Vice-Chairman by a unanimous vote.

Parish and District Councillors had a meeting with the Department of Transport recently. They had gone well-briefed, and the Ministry was put on the defensive, but insisted that, according to the approved criteria, the traffic flow (even though the proportion of heavy lorries is above average) is insufficient to justify the cost of a by-pass. However, the Ministry was forced to agree that the improvement of the 'Watson's Garage' junction is urgent and should be got on with immediately. Although the by-pass was said to be at least 15 years away, it is possible that improvements to be made at Haltwhistle and Brampton will result in the A69 carrying more traffic than at present, which might alter things.

The hanging baskets of Haydon Bridge are ready. If you are willing to put up a hook and keep one watered, contact Cllr Mrs Garrow.

An MSC gang has just about completed refurbishing the Spa, and have renewed the riverside picnic-tables with wood donated by a resident. If you see people vandalising them again, please do not just turn a blind eye.

The new cemetery shed stays where it is: the Parish Council did not need planning permission to erect it anyway. Nevertheless, they expressed regret that the neighbour & householder had been inconvenienced, even though they could offer no redress.

British Rail has hinted that it might be willing to stop an eastbound train at Haydon Bridge between 9.00 and 10.00 am if there is sufficient demand. If you are inconvenienced by the lack of transport at this time of day, inform a member of the Council.

Good news for Brigwood. The Water Authority has decided to include renewal of the mains in its budget for this year.

INFOBUS will not be coming any more. Not enough people made use of its services, so it is going to try to find more customers elsewhere.

Permission to build two houses on Tofts Bank has been refused on appeal. Applications for extensions at Peelwell and in the industrial estate have been passed on to the District.
